Two Policemen Killed During Paris Food Riot

VICHY, June 1.—(AP)—Growing seriousness of the food situation in occupied France was emphasized today by dispatches from Paris reporting that two policemen had been killed and a third wounded while attempting to halt a mob storming a food store.

Despite the efforts of the police, the mob looted the store, tossing food to those outside, who fought for possession.

In another demonstration of violence in Paris a group of youths tumbled an equestrian statue of the British monarch, Edward VII, from its base.

These outbreaks occurred while Pierre Laval, new chief of the Vichy government, was in Paris conferring with industrial and labor leaders.

Nazi Firing Squads Take Twenty More in Prague

LONDON, June 1.—(AP)—The guns of Nazi firing squads broke the Sabbath quiet in Prague yesterday, adding 20 more persons to the list of those executed in reprisal for the attempted assassination of Reich-Protektor Reinhard Heydrich last Wednesday.

The executions brought to 82 the number of those reported shot since the attack. There has been

no indication, however, that any of those executed were directly connected with the wounding of Heydrich, who was said to be in grave condition.

Among those who went before the Nazi executioners yesterday, the Prague radio said, were two high officials of the ministry of agriculture in the protectorate of Bohemia and Moravia.

When the heroes of the Christian faith in these days are finally listed in history's book there will be many names that are Norwegian. The name Berggrav, we believe, may stand high, if not first, on the list, for when it comes to pure unadulterated, breathless Christian courage, the leading bishop of the Norwegian state church becomes a shining light. He has made his name a synonym for courage just as Quisling has become a synonym for cowardice. Bishop Berggrav, according to the information we have in a concentration camp. Eleven hundred Norwegian pastors have resigned their churches and less than sixty pastors are left who support the Quisling regime. They, too, may all land in concentration camps, or worse. It is so easy for us, over here in America to talk of guarding the faith, but the real guarding is being done in Norway, under fire, never, never has there been such a display of the courage which was in Christ. Never has the church world been so thrilled as it is now. As it contemplates the amazing spectacle of this handful of Christian soldiers standing firm against the Nazi hordes, who simply cannot understand such fearlessness. Fools they are for Christ's sake. The world needs a lot more of them. "They climb the steep ascent to heaven through peril, toil and pain. O, God, to us may grace be given, to follow in their train." Amen.

Several other Chekiang towns in the rear of the main fronts were reported retaken by Chinese.
