Celebration On July 4th Planned At Winchester

Tentative plans for the Fourth of July celebration, to be held at Winchester, were made last night by directors of the Roseburg Rod and Gun club. The plans for the picnic have been under discussion for some time, but definite action has been held in abeyance because of the situation with regard to gasoline rationing and general war conditions.
