Firm's Records Filmed As Raid Precaution

In the event Roseburg should be subjected to air raid and the city leveled, many important records would be preserved as a result of action taken by the Umpqua Savings and Loan company.

All notes, mortgages, ledger sheets, minute books and other records of the company have been preserved on micro-film by Hans Pfund, representative of the Federal Home Loan bank of Portland, it was reported today. In this process, each record is photographed on 16mm. film, making it possible to condense the records contained in hundreds of large volumes requiring a great amount of storage space, into a film record requiring only tiny filing space. By means of an enlarging device, the record can at any time be viewed or copied in original size by photography.

The records from the local firm, reduced to film, are being sent to an interior point for vault filing where they will be safe from any possibility of destruction by raid or fire.

Hart Mt. Refuge Taken By Wildlife Service

LAKEVIEW, June 3.—(AP)—The federal fish and wildlife service has taken over land that gave Lake county more taxpayers than residents.

It is a 5800-acre area in the Hart mountain antelope refuge, purchased from the county for \$2 an acre after the county acquired title through tax foreclosures.

Speculators bought the tract in 1909 and sold it in 10 and 20-acre lots throughout the town, giving the county 15,000 taxpayers and 5000 residents 15 years ago. The number of taxpayers still exceeds that of residents.
