## C. W. Bryan Again Seeks Nebraska Governorship

LINCOLN, Nebr., June 4.—(AP)—Charles W. Bryan, whose name is legend in Nebraska politics, filed yesterday for the democratic nomination for governor, an office he has held three times.

Bryan, a brother of the late William Jennings Bryan and democratic vice-presidential nominee in 1924, served several terms as Lincoln's mayor, and many of its stringent liquor regulations were enacted during his administration.

## Warning Given on Eye Solution in Gassed Cases

TACOMA, June 4.—(AP)—Mayor Harry P. Cain warned Tacoma citizens yesterday against putting 12 per cent hydrogen per-

oxide in their eyes, in case they were gassed, as recommended in a recent bulletin issued by the city.

He said a bulletin of instructions on air raid precautions and first aid measures—issued and paid for by Tacoma police and

firemen—recommended a 12 per cent solution in case a person got gas in his eyes.

Cain said he had since learned that such a solution would destroy sight and that no solution stronger than 0.5 per cent should be used.
