Walter R. May Named
Oregon Rationing Chief

PORTLAND, June 6.—(AP)—Walter W. R. May, Portland, took charge of organizing Oregon rationing today after five resignations that caused Governor Sprague to charge that working conditions in the state rationing administration "are no longer agreeable."

May was appointed by Richard G. Montgomery, who became director when the OPA recently took over rationing duties. May will supervise the setting up of 58 price and rationing boards planned by the OPA.

Those who resigned were O. L. Price, state rationing executive and former state director; Albert L. Shellworth, Price's assistant; W. S. Dirker, state sugar rationing executive; Paul T. Shaw, Multnomah county rationing administrator, and O. L. McPherson, Multnomah sugar rationing chief. Price blamed personal business reasons for the resignation. The others did not comment.

Local Daily Paper to
Increase in "Ad" Value

NEW YORK, June 6.—(AP)—The newspaper will assume a position of growing importance in meeting a needed change in advertising and selling methods to fit them into a world vastly altered by war time, William H. Howard, executive vice-president of R. H. Macy and company, said at a convention of National Federation of Sales Executives.

The need is for sharper, briefer messages in advertising to get the sales story across to people who now have less time than ever before for details. The local daily newspaper will assume growing importance in the scheme of things, Howard said, because people will confine their purchases to their own towns. He predicted greater reading of newspapers and magazines and more interest in home decoration.

Roseburg Notified of
Taboo on Fireworks

Local authorities received official notice today of the prohibition on sale and use of all types of fireworks. A formal statement was received from Governor Sprague, reciting the edict of General John L. DeWitt, commanding the western defense area and the fourth army, and instructing state police, sheriffs, fire chiefs, and local law enforcing bodies to rigidly enforce the order.

The restriction applies to all types of fireworks, firecrackers and even cap pistols and affects areas outside of incorporated towns as well as the municipalities, the officers are informed.

Rain Saves Child Who
Inhaled Gasoline Fumes

ALBANY, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—Six-year-old Jackie Hefley of nearby Suver owes his life to a rainstorm.

His father, John Hefley, said today that a few days ago the boy, playing in the rain, unscrewed the cap of a tractor gasoline tank and started inhaling the fumes.

The father, working in a barn, called to the boy to come out of the rain. Hearing no reply, he looked out and saw him lying unconscious beside the tractor. He rushed him to a Monmouth physician.

New York City Blackout
Hailed Great Success

NEW YORK, June 6.—(AP)—There was scarcely a twinkle for 20 minutes last night in the nation's greatest city as New York's 7,573,000 residents blacked out all together for the first time.

Even the subways stopped running. After it was over, Mayor F. H. LaGuardia said enthusiastically: "I think it was really beyond expectation. We have 320 square miles—and bear in mind it is not one person throwing a master switch."

The 173,000 air raid wardens and 19,000 policemen in Manhattan, Brooklyn, the Bronx, Queens and Richmond had only eight hours notice of the test.

Is Hit by S. P. Train

SALEM, June 6.—(AP)—Ernest W. Rogers, 37, employee of a garage at Independence, was instantly killed here yesterday when the service truck he was driving was struck at 14th and Mission streets by the north-bound Cascade, Southern Pacific passenger train.
