Gas Rationing for Easterners Stated

WASHINGTON, June 8.—(AP)—East coast motorists will get an average basic ration of nearly four gallons of gasoline a week under the regular coupon-book system starting next month, Joel Dean, OPA fuel rationing administrator, said today.

Under the present temporary program, non-essential drivers are allowed about three gallons weekly.

Dean told reporters the additional ration would be permitted because of tighter controls made possible under the new plan. Considerably fewer "B" coupons will be issued, Dean explained, since motorists will be required to prove need for supplemental allowances.

They must show to the satisfaction of local rationing boards that use of their cars is required in their businesses, that they have formed transportation "pools" of not less than four persons, or that no other means of transportation is available to get them to and from work.

Arthur Walter Marsh, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Marsh, died Sunday at his home in Lookingglass following a long period of ill health. Born in Roseburg, November 10, 1924, he had resided in Lookingglass throughout his lifetime.

Surviving are his parents, a brother, George, and his grandmother, Mrs. Mary Smith.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Tuesday in the Lookingglass church, Rev. G. A. Garboden officiating. Interment will follow in the Lookingglass cemetery. The arrangements are in charge of the Roseburg Undertaking company.

County Defense Boards Advised on Panic Ban

SALEM, June 8.—(AP)—County defense councils must keep their auxiliary police and air raid wardens on duty after air raids to prevent panic-stricken mass evacuations which might impede the efficient operation of military forces and civilian protection agencies, the state civilian defense council ordered today.

"Should bombs drop on Oregon cities, it is of vital importance that no hysterical attempts at evacuation be permitted," the council's order said.

Aircraft observers in the civilian defense organization will receive enough gasoline so that they will be able to drive to and from their posts, the council said.

Don't Fear Gas Warfare, Army Expert Advises

PORTLAND, June 8.—(AP)—Specialists de-bunked gas warfare here yesterday for 200 Oregon doctors assembled on short notice.

Major Thomas G. Thompson of the army's chemical warfare service advised civilians to respect gases but not to fear them.

Gas warfare should not be unduly dangerous, he said, "if people know how to take care of themselves."

Peace Justice May Serve On Ration Board, Ruling

SALEM, June 8.—(AP)—Any justice of the peace may serve as secretary of a county rationing board, the attorney general ruled today.

No person may hold more than one lucrative state office at any one time, but the attorney general held that a position with a rationing board is not a lucrative office.

Wet Spring Damages Oregon Peas, Cherries

LA GRANDE, June 8.—(AP)—County Agent R. W. Schaaf said today that a cold, wet spring severely damaged Grand Ronde valley cherries and the Austrian winter pea seed crop, valued at \$750,000.

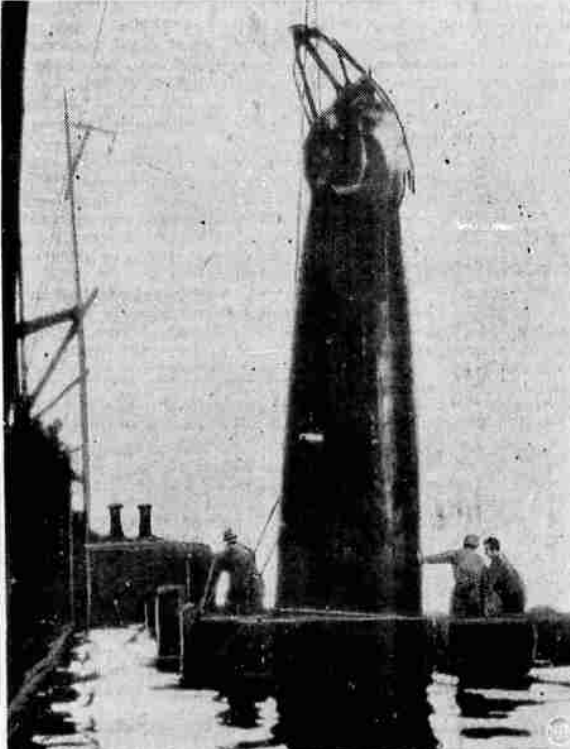

Postal Workers Ask Extension of Federal Pensions

PORTLAND, June 8.—(AP)—Oregon postal clerks yesterday urged adoption of the Rainspeck act, which would set up retirement pay for a large number of federal employees, including ex-members of congress.

Another resolution at the annual convention asked that wives or other eligible dependents of postal clerks called into military service be given post office employment for the duration.

The clerks and the separate letter carriers' association voted next year's convention to Tillamook.

U. of O. Scholarship Won By Clarethel Roselund

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 8.—(Special)—Dr. Earl M.
