Battle at Sevastopol Raging in Sixth Day

cutting "daring daylight raids" on an axis airdrome at Bace. "The bombing was particularly accurate and effective," a communiqué said.

Taranto Again Bombed

As the battle swirled indecisively under a broiling sun, RAF bombers attacked the big Italian naval base at Taranto for the second consecutive night.

An Italian communiqué said known casualties totalled 20 killed, 75 injured, and acknowledged that "several fires flared."

On the English channel front, bad weather kept the RAF's city-destroying offensive against Germany grounded for the third night this month.

Meanwhile, authoritative reports from Vichy said two years of war since Dunkerque had convinced France's Chief of State, Marshal Petain that the axis cannot win.

These reports said Vichy's Premier Laval and Admiral Darlan, chief of Vichy armed forces, still hold the contrary view.

Petain Under Pressure

Sources in close touch with developments around Petain pictured him as a patriot surrounded by intrigues and exposed to pressure from German authorities, yet laboring to protect the integrity of France.

The French people are fully aware of the tragic handicap under which Petain is striving to relieve their suffering, this informant said. They know that Petain was forced by the Germans to accept Laval as his chief of government, possibly by threatening to occupy all of France.

German pressure is reported to involve many other threats of dire consequences for the French if they fail to collaborate. These include even threats of reprisal against French prisoners of war in Germany. Some Frenchmen fear particularly the possibility that these 1,500,000 prisoners in German hands might be maltreated or starved.

There are limits to what the axis could accomplish by such

pressure, however. As outlined in authoritative reports received here these limits are Hitler's reluctance to undertake a complete occupation of France, with the vast increase in troops of occupation such a move would make necessary; and Hitler's equal reluctance to provoke revolution in France at the very time he hopes to squeeze the utmost in war production out of French workers.

Grants Pass Man Dies In Crash; 2 Others Hurt

KLAMATH FALLS, June 10.—(AP)—Kenneth G. Tompkins, 35, was fatally injured and Dick Lessard, 27, and Raymond Hessel Hayes, 33, were slightly hurt last night when their car plunged over a rocky embankment two miles west of Beatty, near here, state police said today. All were from Grants Pass.

Hayes, in the county jail today charged with being drunk on a public highway, told officers that the car operated by Tompkins, rounded a turn on the highway, straightened out for approximately 100 yards then rode the shoulder before it plunged down a 15-foot embankment.

The trio was vacationing here.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 10.—(AP)—Kenneth G. Tompkins, fatally injured in an automobile wreck at Beatty yesterday, received a decree of divorce here also yesterday from Mary Evelina Tompkins. A daughter, Diane, aged 8, survives as do Tompkins' mother, Mrs. G. H. Kesterson, and his brother, Chester, both of Grants Pass.

70 Get Training For Fire Season In Umpqua Forest

Seventy men who are to be employed on the protection crew of the Umpqua national forest during the fire season are getting a real workout at the five-day fire school now in progress at Wolf creek forest camp, according to V. V. Harpham, supervisor.

Because of the fact that more than 70 per cent of the men have had little or no previous experience, they are being given actual field work instead of exclusively, classroom instruction. The school, which opened Monday and will close Friday, is being held for five days instead of three, as in the past, in order that ample training may be given. Mr. Harpham said. The men are being taken long distances over mountain trails and are working under all conditions while they practice fire fighting methods.

The school is being directed by Ray B. Hampton, fire assistant, with local staff members and all district rangers serving as instructors.

A school will be held June 15, 16 and 17, at Wolf creek for the small crews, Mr. Harpham reports. Approximately 30 men will attend. They are to be divided into five to 10-man crews, which will engage in forest burning and improvement work when not fighting fires. They will be situated throughout the forest and will be available at all times for fire fighting, but when not so engaged, will work on trails, telephone lines, camp grounds, etc., making needed improvements.
