U-Boat Captain Aids His Victims

(By the Associated Press)

Enemy submarines operating in the western Atlantic and eastern Pacific areas were credited as of today with having sunk a total of 226 allied and neutral ships since Pearl harbor.

The latest announced victims included two small American fishing craft, a medium-sized English merchantman and a medium-sized United States merchant vessel for an Atlantic war score of 259 sinkings.

The latest announced sinking was of a United States vessel whose survivors said the submarine commander helped the American lifeboats to make a safe getaway. The navy said the entire crew, excepting the captain who was killed, had been landed safely. One survivor said the sub commander personally helped an injured crew member off the blazing ship and into a lifeboat and gave water and coffee to the escaping crew.

Military Pay Bill Goes to President

WASHINGTON, June 11.—(AP)—The senate completed congressional approval today of a military wage adjustment bill fixing a minimum pay scale of \$50 a month for the armed forces, effective as of June 1, 1942.

Adoption of a conference report, approved yesterday by the house, sent the comprehensive pay measure to President Roosevelt for his consideration.

Estimated to cost an additional \$500,000,000 or more yearly, the bill would increase to \$50 a month the pay of army buck privates, navy apprentice seamen and men of equal rank in the marines and

coast guard. Increases would be granted to all ranks up to and including second lieutenants and ensigns. Privates now get a minimum of \$21 a month.

Rental and subsistence allowances of higher ranking officers also would be increased.
