

### Seals Rise to 4th Position by Twin Win Over Rainiers

(By the Associated Press) The San Francisco Seals of the Pacific coast league took two games from Seattle last night to climb into fourth place and the upper division for the first time since they slumped to the bottom of the heap early in the season.

The wins, both by a 3-to-2 margin as was a San Francisco victory on the previous night, dropped the former league-leading Rainiers, three-time coast champions, into sixth position behind Oakland.

Seattle scored in the first and last frames of the first game, a seven-inning affair which featured a pitching tilt between Gibson, veteran Seal hurler, and Rainier chucker, Garnett and Libke.

San Francisco batsmen paced by Fain, who has been in a batting slump, bunched five hits for their rallies in the second and third innings to drive Carnett from the mound.

In the nine-inning nightcap, all of the scoring came in the first three innings. Seattle took a two-run lead in the first on three hits and a walk and the Seals came back in the second to tie the count by means of two hits, a walk and an error.

Fisher, Seattle pitcher, continued to have bad luck in the third when he gave up a hit and two walks to load the bases and then walked Fain to, force the winning run.

The Oaks blanked San Diego 5 to 0 in a twilight game behind the five-hit twirling of Salvesson. At Sacramento, Donnelly, the league strike-out king held the Los Angeles Angels to five hits as the Solons took their second straight game from the Angels, 3 to 1.

Gay, Hollywood pitcher who has lost his last six games, turned out a seven-hitter as his teammates blasted Portland for 16 hits and a 9-to-3 win. Orrell started on the mound for the Beavers and gave up 13 hits and seven runs before Stine took over in the eighth.

### Cardinals Creep Closer to League Leading Dodgers

(By the Associated Press) Seven games were scheduled in the majors yesterday but only five of them were started and two of these never got far enough to get into the records.

The second-place Cardinals nosed out the Philadelphia Phils, 2-1. That chopped the distance between them and the league-leading Dodgers to six and a half games.

Cooper held the Phils to five hits, shading Hughes in a hurling duel.

The Chicago Cubs protected their sixth place berth from Boston, handing the Braves their tenth straight setback, 3-2. Olsen, beaten in four previous outings, limited the Braves to six hits in his first victory of the year. The Cubs patted Javery for nine blows.

In the only American league game played the Athletics tripped the Cleveland Indians, 5-4, on the five-hit pitching of Fowler and Christopher.

Fowler, who went 16 innings on his last appearance and lost a tough one to the St. Louis Browns, retired in the sixth inning after being nicked on the arm by Kennedy, third Cleveland pitcher.

**To Save Redwoods**  
SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Because the members fear the vast redwood forests of California may be felled as part of the war effort, the Save-the-Redwoods league has started a campaign for help. The giant trees, which are largely privately owned by lumber interests, are prized building material.

### Sprague Raps Use Of U. S. Agency to Acquire Utilities

SALEM, June 13—(AP)—Governor Sprague said yesterday he is "opposed to forcing public ownership of electric power facilities on communities through the device of using a federal agency to acquire private power systems."

The governor, commenting on the Bone bill and other bills in congress to establish a Columbia power administration, said further in a letter to B. H. Kizer, Spokane, regional chairman of the national resources planning board:

"The evident intent of the various Columbia power authority bills is to do just that, and the wartime emergency is used as an excuse to push forward this program."

"In my judgment, there is not a war condition which makes immediate action necessary. In fact, it is wiser policy to defer such controversial questions as public ownership for post-war decision."

**Offers Own Ideas**  
Governor Sprague, setting forth his own ideas regarding organization of a power administration said:

A. Planning for state and regional development should continue to be done by existing state and regional agencies, headed up in the national resources board.

B. Projects recommended by such agencies should require approval by congress and appropriations from congress.

C. The rights and interests of states and communities should be given due consideration. Existing federal agencies, such as the reclamation service and army engineers, should be used in their respective spheres, without making one authority superior to other agencies.

D. The proper function for a power authority is wholesale distribution of electric energy. This authority should operate as a part of the department of the interior, with a single executive head.

E. The authority should not over-ride state regulatory agencies in fixing of resale rates for energy.

**Super-Government Opposed**  
"I am strongly opposed to vesting broad powers in a regional authority, as is contemplated in some of the power authority bills which have been introduced in congress," the governor said, asserting that this would "establish

a super-government, extra-constitutional in character." He also protested that some of these bills would grant water rights superseding rights which already have been granted for irrigation.

It is not sufficient to freeze at present levels payments in lieu of state and local taxes on utility property which may pass into public ownership, he said.

The governor proposed that congressional hearings be held in the northwest to give residents of this region a chance to express their views on the bill.
