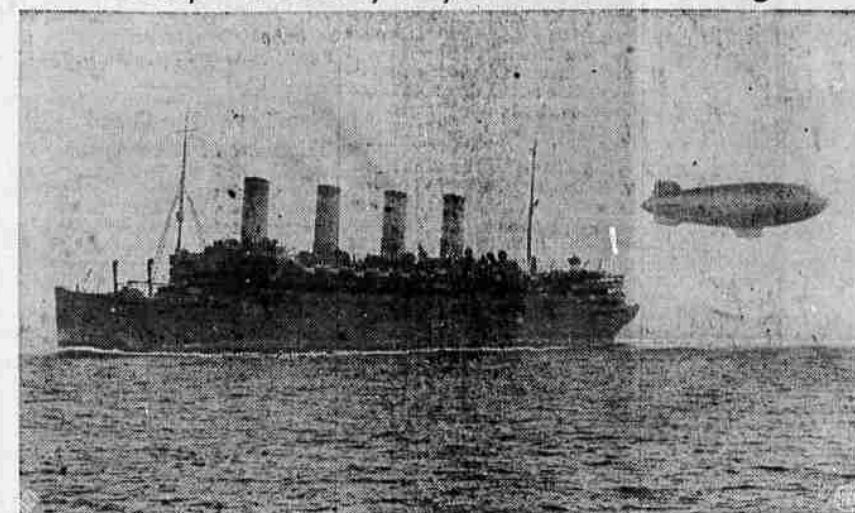

Funeral services will be held at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel, Rev. C. A. Edwards officiating.

Retailer's Need of Ad Help Stressed at Meet

COLUMBUS, O., June 15.—(AP)—Efforts of newspaper advertising executives to aid retailers in explaining price control programs to the public were lauded by Price Administrator Leon Henderson in a message read today at the opening session of the Newspaper Advertising Executives association convention.

"Today—he (the retailer) needs that help more than ever, for his own sake, for the sake of all of us," Henderson said. "That is why I hope I may see exhibits of advertisements signed by retailers which will help inspire—messages that will go a long way toward creating public understanding of the price control program—the understanding we must have if we are to continue full speed to victory and to the victories of peace after that."
