Advice Given On Aiding Yourself In Case of Gas Raid

1. SELF AID IS THE BEST AID for the prevention of injuries due to war gases. War gases are usually not dangerous if you take steps immediately to remove them from the eyes and skin. Effective means to accomplish this should be in the kitchen and bathroom of every home. Always keep on stock a supply of laundry soap and baking soda.

2. IF YOU ARE INSIDE A BUILDING remain there and go upstairs for war gases clinging to the ground. Do not leave your home unless it is absolutely necessary. If you are outside and not able to get indoors immediately, walk—don't run—to get out of the gas area. Avoid puddles of liquid agent and basements, valleys and other low places.

3. IF YOU HAVE BEEN EXPOSED TO A WAR GAS—

a. Breathe through cloths wet with baking soda solution.
b. If you are outside of a building first remove your outer clothing and leave it outside before entering.
c. Wash your hands and then your face with laundry soap and water.

d. Wash your eyes at once with a large amount of a solution of baking soda: one teaspoonful of baking soda in a glass of water.
e. Take a bath using plenty of laundry soap.

f. Wash your eyes again with baking soda solution. Repeat.

4. IF SPLASHES OF LIQUID GAS HAVE GOTTEN ON YOU—
a. Blot up as much liquid as you can and be careful not to spread it. Use small pieces of cloth, cleaning or toilet tissue. Destroy the cloth or tissue.
b. Dab the contaminated area with cloths wet with Chlorox, Purex, San-Chlor, or other similar chlorine solution.
c. Repeat steps b, c, and d in 3 above.

5. REMAIN CALM. Lie down and cover yourself with a blanket. Medical aid is on the way. There is no immediate serious danger from exposure to any known war gas.

Medics Warned On Sulfonamide Use

SALT LAKE CITY, June 16.—(AP)—Medical men must be "made to realize that * * * promiscuous and uncontrolled sulfonamide medication is extremely dangerous," Prof. Ernest C. McCulloch, Washington State college bacteriologist, declared today.

"All sulfonamide drugs are harmful to a greater or lesser degree," he asserted. "They are not the cure-all they have been built up to appear in the public mind, and they can—and sometimes do—kill."

By their "spectacular and dramatic results," he said in a paper prepared for delivery at the Pacific division meeting of the American association for the advancement of science, they "have continued to dominate both clinical medicine and cateriology" during the last year.

But sulfonamide is not the first drug to be accepted by both scientists and laymen as a panacea, McCulloch stated.

"Our psychology appears to demand that a new and useful therapeutic agent first be over-evaluated, then over-criticized, and finally by sheer merit in those conditions in which it is the drug of choice, to be saved from condemnation and discard by those who previously have misused it and who demanded a continuous performance of miracles."

Because so many new sulfonamide drugs are being made available, he added, "the period of over-evaluation is apt to be extended and the disappointments especially bitter."

Many of the sulfonamide drugs, McCulloch pointed out, have high toxic qualities and "there is little point in saving the patient from an infection if the therapy proves fatal."

Income Limit Proposal May Get No Action Now

Secretary Morgenthau presented a \$7,600,000,000 tax program to congress last March 3 but the first action in the house probably will not come before the middle of next month.

100 Per. Supertax Urged
Randolph Paul, tax adviser to Secretary Morgenthau, yesterday formally requested a \$25,000 flat limitation on individual incomes after federal income taxes were paid.

President Roosevelt first broached the idea in a message to congress April 27.

Paul proposed a flat 100 per cent supertax on individual incomes above \$25,000 after payment of taxes, and on married couples' incomes above \$50,000.

He estimated that about 11,000 single persons and married couples would be affected by the proposed limitations, which would produce about \$184,000,000.

Democratic Leader Barkley of Kentucky said it appeared unlikely the senate finance committee would receive the new tax bill before July 15 at the earliest, and any recess must be postponed until after that time.

Crop Loan Issue Muddled
A compromise that would permit farmers to obtain full parity loans on major crops and still allow the government to sell surplus wheat at a lower price was reported under White House consideration today.

The proposal was said to have been advanced by some members of a joint conference committee, striving to break a senate-house deadlock on major features of the annual \$680,000,000 farm appropriations bill.

Chief element of the controversy has been a senate amendment authorizing the government to sell up to 125,000,000 bushels of wheat for livestock feeding purposes at about 83 cents a bushel instead of the full parity price of \$1.34 a bushel.

The house insisted on the latter figure and some senators have advocated its adoption but there have been reports that President Roosevelt might veto the bill if this were done.

Senators Bankhead (D-Ala.) and Russell (D-Ga.) already have pending a bill requiring mandatory government loans up to full parity on major crops and some members said it was possible an agreement could be reached to include such a provision in the appropriations bill, retaining the senate-approved authority for the government to sell wheat at the 83 cent level.

U. S. Fliers, RAF Hit Italians in Sea Combat

said nazi air and naval forces sank four cruisers and destroyers, probably sank another destroyer and damaged six other warships in attacks on British Mediterranean convoys.

The Germans also asserted that six merchant ships were sunk, eight others probably sunk and six damaged, and implied that these losses were inflicted on a west-bound convoy and were in addition to those reported by the Italians.

The fascist version said three British warships were sunk and 17 other ships sunk, set afire or damaged.

"The Shole battle or series of battles revolved about an apparent axis attempt to smash British supply lines to Malta and to North Africa, where the flaming desert struggle between weary British and axis forces appeared to be nearing a finale."

Axis Claims "Fantastic"
New supplies have been delivered successfully to the garrisons at Malta and Tobruk, it was announced officially in London tonight.

"Fantastic enemy claims" of losses suffered by the convoy and protecting craft are "without foundation," the announcement by the admiralty and air ministry declared.

(In North Africa the flaming desert battle between British and

axis armies appears to be reaching a finale.

Adolf Hitler's high command asserted broadly that axis troops had already won the latest battle of Libya which started May 26.

"The battle in Libya to the west of Tobruk has ended in favor of German and Italian troops," a nazi communique said.

"After destroying enemy defensive forces near Acroma in a pursuit to the north, our troops crossed the Via Balbo and reached the coast."

"British and south African troops at Ain El Gazala (coastal anchor of the British defense line) were cut off from Tobruk."

"The extent of the victory cannot yet be estimated."

Imperial British headquarters acknowledged that British troops had withdrawn from positions below Ain El Gazala, 40 miles west of Tobruk, as Marshal Erwin Rommel's armored columns attempted to cut off the key British stronghold.

A British communique said the withdrawal was executed successfully "under cover of a magnificent fight by troops holding positions around Acroma and the first armored division who beat off determined enemy attacks throughout the whole of June 14."

Acroma lies 10 miles west of Tobruk.

In the El Adem sector, due south of Tobruk, the British reported that three strong axis attacks yesterday were repulsed "with heavy loss to the enemy."

Both Sides Near Exhaustion
Military observers in Cairo, headquarters of Gen. Auchinleck's British forces, said both sides appeared near the exhaustion point after three weeks of furious see-saw fighting and that the fifth Libyan offensive probably would fizzle out in a stalemate.

Italy's high command asserted that German and Italian troops had penetrated to the Mediterranean sea coast above Acroma, which would mean that Rommel had succeeded in cutting off Tobruk from the main British line to the west. The British said they had no information about any such thrust.

A fascist communique also declared that axis forces had "reached and passed" the British Ain El Gazala positions and said "hundreds" of British motorized units were knocked out of action or destroyed.

Italy Claims Sea Victory
Meanwhile, the Italian high command claimed victory in "a great air and naval battle" which ended in the Mediterranean last night, asserting that three British warships were sunk and 17 ships

sunk, set afire or damaged. An Italian heavy cruiser was acknowledged sunk and a destroyer seriously damaged.

A communique said Italian warships attacked "two great convoys arriving from the western and eastern ends of the sea."

A German broadcast, quoting informed Italian quarters, said the two convoys consisted of 37 ships, probably including a United States battleship.

The broadcast said a west-bound convoy included seven cargo ships escorted by a battleship, two aircraft carriers, five cruisers and 20 torpedo boats.

It was the first British convoy to attempt the perilous east-bound run through the Mediterranean in four months.

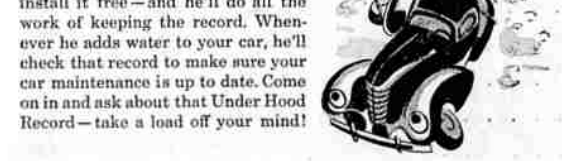
