

Proposed Buying of Private Utilities Entails Huge Sum

WASHINGTON, June 16.—(AP)—A Bonneville power economist estimated today a maximum bond issue of \$141,419,000 would be necessary for acquisition of private power companies in the Pacific northwest for their resale to public bodies.

D. L. Marlett, executive assistant to the Bonneville administrator, told a joint congressional committee considering legislation to set up a Columbia power administration that if the bonds were issued at a rate of 3 1/2 per cent interest an excess of \$758,000 would be realized the first year after meeting obligations.

Marlett explained to the committee hearing on the Smith-Bone bills that he had used maximum figures in his calculations on the eight private power companies operating in Washington and Oregon, and he believed the interest rate on the bond issue would be 1 to 2 per cent less than 3 1/2.

The \$141,419,000, he added, was the maximum theoretical amount of the bond issue and 3 1/2 per cent the maximum interest rate. Marlett also said arrangements had been made with the treasury to market the bonds in such a way as not to conflict with the treasury's war financing program.

A statement by R. B. Lane, of Cheney, president of the Northwest Public Power association, was read into the record, expressing opposition on the grounds local control would be jeopardized.

The Lane statement said 70 per cent of the municipalities grange members of the association were opposed to the Smith-Bone bills.

It was his eighth straight victory and made him the first big league twirler to hit the ten-game winner bulls-eye this year.

The triumph moved the Cubs back into fifth place, and dropped the Pittsburgh Pirates into sixth, because the Bucs lost the only other game on the big league schedule yesterday. This was a 6-2 setback pinned on them by the New York Giants.

The Bucs had the misfortune to run into Schumacher on one of his better afternoons. For seven innings, Hal tossed a two-hitter. Then he eased up, gave a pair of runs in the eighth and coasted home.

Wm. Tell Stunt Lands Men in Hospital, Jail

SOUTH PLAINFIELD, N. J., June 15.—(AP)—A 1942 reenactment of William Tell's famous shooting feat—a bullet replacing Tell's arrow—ended unsuccessfully yesterday when James Powell was treated at a hospital for a

slight bullet wound of the head. Police Captain Ten Eyck said Louis Anderson had attempted unsuccessfully to shoot off Powell's hat. Anderson admitted firing a .22 caliber rifle at Powell, Ten Eyck declared, but said he did so at Powell's request.

Ten Eyck said Mrs. Powell corroborated Anderson's story and declared her husband had often been a human target-bearer in Georgia, where they formerly lived.

Anderson will have a hearing on an assault charge tomorrow.

Coffee Rioters Battle Gestapo in Hamburg

LONDON, June 15.—(AP)—Unconfirmed reports from Stockholm, published in London today, said seven policemen were killed and 25 German dock workers later executed as a result of rioting over coffee in Hamburg.

The published account said stevedores loading freight cars with coffee for the troops started the outbreak by tossing packages of coffee into the street where a crowd began fighting for them.

The Gestapo was said to have been stoned by the crowd when it attempted to break up the fight.

For each quart jar (or #3 can) of fruit you plan to put up, you will need:

FRUITS	QUANTITY
APPLES	2 1/2 lbs. (7 or 8 apples)
BERRIES	1 1/4 to 1 1/2 lbs. (5 cups)
CHERRIES	1 1/4 to 1 1/2 lbs. (6 cups)
PEACHES	2 to 2 1/2 lbs. (8 to 10 peaches)
PEARS	2 to 2 1/2 lbs. (5 to 6 pears)
PLUMS	1 1/2 to 2 lbs. (24 to 32 plums)
TOMATOES	2 1/2 to 3 1/2 lbs. (8 to 10 tomatoes)
