Former CCC Officer Here Now Serves As Major in Army Air Corps



Word has been received here that Captain Ivan I. Hawes, above, who is stationed at an air force training school near Roswell, New Mexico, has been promoted to the rank of major. Hawes, who for more than a year was a member of the army personnel at the South Umpqua Falls CCC camp, is a graduate of the Fort Benning infantry school and was commissioned as a second lieutenant in 1932. He was promoted to first lieutenant in 1935. In 1940 he became a captain and was transferred to the air force, being assigned to the Mira Loma flight academy at Oxnard, Calif., as commandant of cadets. He remained there until recently, when he was transferred to the newly established air school at Roswell.

Before entering military service Major Hawes, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred J. Hawes of Portland, graduated from high school and attended Reed college in that city. He was employed later as a branch manager for the Western Union there.

"Lord teach us to pray." The greatest verses in the Bible are those found in Matt. which we call "The Lord's Prayer." In no other passage do we find so much of divine wisdom and revelation of our duties and privileges in the kingdom of God. At the request of a humble disciple, Jesus gave to the world its supreme prayer. He prayed regularly and without ceasing, and so He teaches us to pray. Prayer to God is man's greatest privilege. It is to commune with the God of the universe. The Lord's prayer is the gospel in miniature, the summary of the Kingdom of God. We are never to "repeat" but always to pray this prayer earnestly from the heart. We find seven separate petitions in this model prayer. The first three look toward God, the fourth petition toward ourselves, and the last three toward our duties to others and to God. These seven petitions cover all the Christian life. Six are for spiritual and only one for material needs. One suggestive translation is "leading us out of temptation, deliver us from evil." We may fall into temptations too strong for us, therefore we need God's help. Prayer is the Christian's vital breath, the Christian's native air, his watchword at the gates of death. He enters heaven with prayers. Lord teach us to pray. Amen.

Growers of Seed Crops Again Urged To Order Sacks

The Douglas county USDA war board this week renewed a warning to growers of seed crops to order the cotton bags they will need immediately. Growers are asked to act without delay to prevent a threatened shortage of containers.

An estimated 25,000 cotton bags will be needed for Douglas county's cover crop seed production this year, Lee Sparks, chairman of the war board, reported. Unless all of the bags that will be needed are ordered by growers within the next few days, a shortage is certain when harvesting begins, the chairman warned.

Mr. Sparks explained that the war production board has allocated ample supplies of cotton bagging material to make containers for northwest seed crops. However, inventories of bag manufacturers are limited to a 30-day supply, and for this reason manufacturers have been unable to make bags without a backlog of orders. The situation is further complicated by the demand for cotton bagging material. Unless material allocated for seed bags is used at once, it will be taken for war purposes or diverted to other areas for grain bags.

There is no advantage in delaying the buying of needed bags, growers are advised. On May 25, all types of new cotton and burlap bags were placed under a price ceiling by the office of price administration.

Pierce Insists On 3-Man Board for Columbia Power

WASHINGTON, June 17.—(AP)—Representative Pierce (D-Ore.) recommended today that legislation to create a Columbia power authority to market energy from federally built hydroelectric projects at Grand Coulee and Bonneville be amended to provide a three-man board instead of a single administrator.

Pierce told a joint congressional committee considering the Smith-Bone bills to establish the authority that such a board would be "more pleasing to the people of the northwest."

"If an ideal man could be found perhaps a single administrator would be better," he added, "but a three-man board has done well with TVA and I believe it will be the best for Columbia."

The Smith-Bone bills would empower the authority to purchase existing privately owned utilities in the Pacific northwest and to resell them to municipalities and public utility districts for public distribution of Bonneville and Grand Coulee power.

Post-War Surge Foreseen
Pierce said several amendments he offered would safeguard these transactions and protect an existing wholesale rate of \$17.50 a kilowatt year which under his suggestion could not be increased except by an act of congress.

"An era of great industrial development is ahead in the Pacific northwest when the war ceases," he told the committee, "and industry should have the assurance the wholesale rate will not be raised after investments are made."

Other amendments he offered would prevent interference with irrigation rights, shine "the glare of publicity" on purchase and resale of private utilities, let cities and public utility districts "sit in at the bargaining table," authorize construction of competing lines in instances where the price asked for the private companies is deemed too high, and make interconnection border contracts as short as possible.

Albert S. Goss, master of the national grange, also supported the bills. He said the only solution for distribution of Columbia river power was the "complete purchase of private utilities and coordination with Bonneville and Grand Coulee."

India Leader Warns On Promises of Japan

NEW DELHI, India, June 17.—(AP)—Jawaharlal Nehru, influential leader of the All-India congress party, said today that "the situation in India is becoming intolerable" but warned that, despite Tokyo's promises, the Japanese, if victorious, would only continue "India's subjugation."

"We cannot carry on as impulsive spectators," he declared. "Other deeds are necessary." Nehru, the still powerful Mohandas K. Gandhi and other influential men in the congress party have been conferring at Wardha on whether they can further their goal of Indian independence by helping or hindering Britain's war effort.

Although some reports had described Nehru and Gandhi as not in full accord on what should be done, Nehru described his views as closely approximating those of Gandhi.
