

Dodgers Facing Series With 2nd Place Cardinals

Result May Change League's Leaders; Trout of Detroit Shuts Out N. Y. Yankees

The St. Louis Cardinals, riding the crest of a seven-game winning streak, will move into Brooklyn today for a five-game series with the Dodgers that may throw the National league pennant struggle back into a battle royal.

Through quirks of the weather these two fierce rivals have met only four times thus far and of these games the Redbirds have won three—proving to the satisfaction, at least, that the Dodgers' 4½ game lead is an uncertain bulwark.

The Cardinals warmed up for today's important tussle by whitewashing the New York Giants, 3-0, on the five-hit hurling of Cooper, who pitched no-hit ball till the seventh inning. It was the fourth shutout of the season by Cooper and his second over the Giants.

The Dodgers showed no qualms at the approach of their challengers, turning back the Chicago Cubs, 5-1. Higbe pitched four-hit ball for his sixth victory and would have had a shutout except for a homer by Russell.

Brooklyn was held to seven hits by Bill Lee, but Vaughn, returning to action after an illness, tripled for two runs and Camilli hit his tenth home run of the year for two more.

At Detroit Trout, who had been beaten five times in a row, hurled a five-hitter to hand the world champion New York Yankees their first shutout of the season as the Tigers won, 1-0. Breuer of the Yanks allowed just six safeties, but three were singles in the last of the ninth for the game's only run.

Marchildon of the Philadelphia Athletics also ended a five-game losing streak by pitching five-hit ball to beat the Chicago White Sox, 4-3.

Auker stopped a nine-game winning streak for the Boston Red Sox and a seven-game losing streak for the St. Louis Browns by hurling a six-hit 6-3 victory.

The Cleveland Indians nosed out the Washington Senators, 5-4, in a night game, with Keltner driving in the tying and winning runs on a seventh inning single with the bases loaded.

The Cincinnati Reds captured both ends of a doubleheader at Boston, 4-2 and 4-3, the latter game going 11 innings. The Reds were held to six hits by three Boston hurlers in the opener, but bunched them effectively while

Contraption Goes 200 Miles on Gaiion of Gas

MEMPHIS, Tenn.—(AP)—Neither gasoline nor tire rationing bothers J. T. Giles, 82-year-old

photographer, who has traveled far and wide in a one-passenger home-built 3-wheel type of motorcycle.

Giles bought a small one-and-one-half horsepower motor built a chassis around it with parts picked up at random and now has a vehicle that travels up to 25 miles an hour and goes about 200 miles on one gallon of gas.

He recently took a trip to Washington and the east coast, steering with an axe handle. The trip was easy, he said. He just hooked a trailer containing his camping equipment to the vehicle and started out.

The motor, connected with the wheels by belts and chains, has only one gear. The only foot pedal controls the brake and the car has no accelerator. The gas feed is automatic.

Giles solved the tire problem, too. One of the pneumatic tires was made for a wheelbarrow, another for a one-wheel trailer, the third for a small tractor.

The inventor also has an emery wheel on the chassis. He hooks it up to the motor and makes extra money sharpening knives.

Changes Noted In Douglas County's School Districts

Various changes in school district organization through consolidations and dissolutions have been made during the past year and are in prospect for the future, Lula C. Gorrell, county school superintendent, reported today.

The Wilbur-Winchester union high school district has been dissolved, effective this month, and the territory is to become a part of the non-high school territory, the school superintendent states. The district has transported its pupils to Roseburg during the past school year. The fine school building at Wilbur has been sold for the sum of \$1 to the Wilbur school district by the union high school district and will be used for elementary school purposes.

It will be necessary, Mrs. Gorrell states, for the county education board which governs the non-high school territory of the county to assign Wilbur union high school district to one of the several non-high school zones of the county. It is expected this action will be taken at the board's next meeting which will be held Tuesday, June 23.

The Eureka school district, No. 13, located north of Drain, has voted consolidation with the Drain district, adding valuation of \$50,910. The district has a census of 16 children of school age.

District 36, Scottsburg, and District 34, Elkton, will vote July 17 on a proposal to consolidate the Yoncalla district with Elkton. Petitions for the election were acted upon Wednesday by the school boundary board which set the date for the election. The Scottsburg district has a valuation of \$108,495 and a school enrollment of 18. The Elkton district, which constructed a new school building last year, has a valuation of \$133,935 and an enrollment of 74.

Petitions now are being circulated in district 101, Buck creek near Anlauf and district No. 58, Curtin, which would consolidate Buck creek with Curtin. The Buck creek district, which has a valuation of \$37,185, has been transporting eight pupils to the Curtin district, which has a valuation of \$296,265 and an enrollment of 23.

Earlier this year Glenbrook district, No. 20, was consolidated with Riddle district, No. 70. Sunshine district No. 75, has been dissolved, due to the fact that it did not have sufficient pupils to maintain a school, and the territory, with a valuation of \$103,560, has been divided between Wilbur district, No. 2, and Smick district, No. 75.
