State Guards to Receive Realistic Training

WASHINGTON, June 19.—(AP)—Secretary of War Stimson yesterday announced that new tasks had been defined for the state guards formed to take the place of national guard units now in national service.

The army is to provide part-time instructors to give realistic training, whenever they can be spared, through the commanders of the army's nine corps areas.

A new war department directive said the state guardsmen would be expected to deal with disturbances and disasters, to guard vital facilities, suppress enemy agents, and cope with parachute troops.

New Army Set-Up To be No Refuge For Draft Dodgers

WASHINGTON, June 18.—(AP)—The war department announced today that it would reduce the number of officers assigned to duty in Washington, replacing many of them with members of the new army specialist corps, but made it plain that the new organization was no haven for job hunters or draft dodgers.

In a directive to Dwight F. Davis, director general of the specialist corps, Secretary Stimson outlined the policy for its selection of profession or technical personnel for administrative duties, primarily to release army officers for service with troops.

"All political or personal considerations will be rigidly excluded," said Stimson, "and care will be exercised to insure the appointment of men who are fully qualified and specifically needed."

"Any attempt to provide employment for men seeking a job, or pay at a higher rate than that received in civil life, is contrary to approved policies and, of course, cannot be tolerated."

"Moreover, it will be necessary to insure that every reasonable measure is taken to avoid use of the army specialist corps as a means of evading active military duty under the selective service act."

The fundamental basis for appointment of individuals in the corps, the secretary said, would be that their services in administrative professional, scientific or technical capacities which would release officers and enlisted men for command or combat duty.

Defense Let-Down Feared From Stimson's Remark

LOS ANGELES, June 19.—(AP)—The county defense council fears the morale of its volunteer workers will be impaired by Secretary Stimson's statement that recent Japanese naval setbacks have materially reduced the danger of attacks on the Pacific coast.

Dysentery Conquered With New Sulfa Drug

PORTLAND, Ore., June 19.—(AP)—Sulfasulazine, a new drug, is medicine's answer to tropical dysentery, long-time scourge of soldiers fighting in hot climes.

Dr. Warfield M. Fior told the Pacific Northwest Medical association convention yesterday that the new sulfa drug "will prove a great boon to United States soldiers, especially those fighting in the tropics."

On the basis of experimental use in more than 250 cases and 35 operations, the associate professor of surgery at Johns Hopkins medical school predicted sulfasulazine would revolutionize surgery in certain intestinal tract cases.

The federal food and drug administration has released the new drug to the medical profession, he said.

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Permit to Raise Fuel Prices Asked

The Roseburg Lumber company has filed an application with the office of price administration for authority to increase fuel prices, Kenneth Ford, owner-manager, announced today. The price increase asked, he stated, would amount to about \$1 per unit on sawdust and \$1 per cord on slabwood.

Because of increased payroll and delivery costs, together with difficulty and expense in maintaining trucks and other facilities has made it necessary to obtain increased prices for the fuel department is to be continued, Mr. Ford stated.

The price for sawdust and cordwood in Roseburg has been extremely low and far below the average charged elsewhere, Mr. Ford stated. This low price resulted, he said, from the fact that the local company had no other means of disposing of sawdust and mill waste. Installation of a refuse burner, however, was completed recently and as the waste can be burned more economically than it can be handled for fuel at the present prices, the fuel department probably will be discontinued if the request for a price increase is denied, Ford said.

The Roseburg company has nearly complete arrangements for muster into state guard service, and it is anticipated that applicants who enlist tonight will be included in the muster order.

The company will hold its regular weekly drill tonight and any men desiring to take membership in the company are invited to be at the Roseburg armory at 7:30 p. m., where they can contact Captain Dunn or company officers for information or enlistment.
