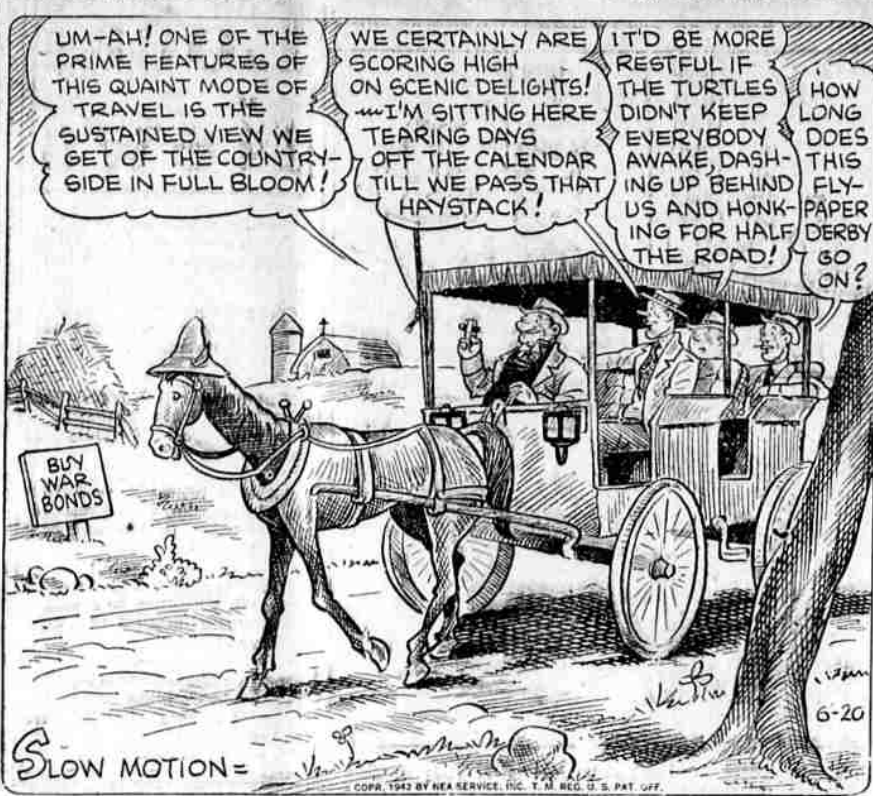
Evangelist to Close Series Here Sunday

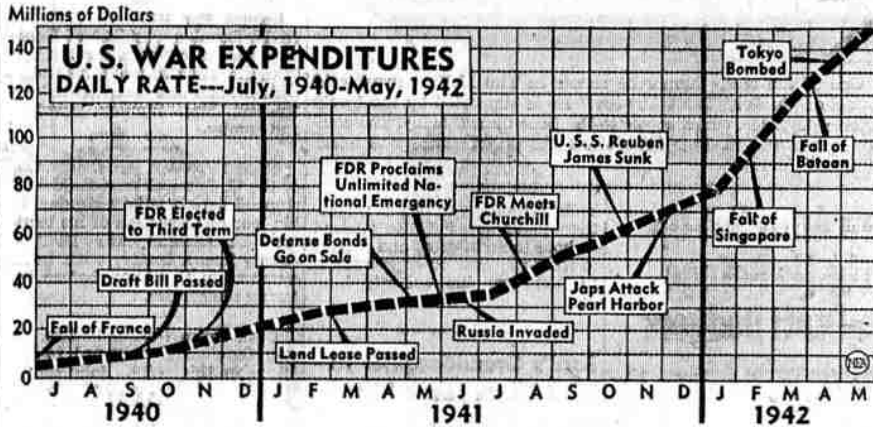


Chart shows rate of daily spending on U. S. war effort since mid-1940 when country recognized its peril

Czar Named To Boost Western Lumber Industry

WASHINGTON, June 19.—(AP)—Emphasizing the nation's growing lumber shortage as a result of heavy military demands, War Production Board Chairman Donald M. Nelson today appointed a western log and lumber czar to boost west coast production, and announced that skilled lumbermen in the area would be granted temporary draft deferments.

Nelson said that Frederick H. Brundage, on leave as associate regional United States forester in the sixth region, had been made western lumber administrator with "the full powers of the war production board to carry out such action programs as may be necessary in order to obtain the quantities and quantities of lumber required by the program."

A management-labor advisory board from the western lumber industry will be named soon to assist Brundage.

Noting that Pacific coast log and lumber production was running below last year's output, chiefly because of a scarcity of skilled labor, Nelson disclosed that arrangements had been made with the selective service system for the listings of skilled lumbermen in Pacific coast states as men in "critical occupations" subject to temporary deferment from military service as necessary to production of lumber for the war effort.

In addition, Nelson requested lumber owners and operators on the coast to "log at this time the best and most accessible timber in the region" and use their existing equipment to the fullest possible extent, substituting water and rail transportation for use of trucks wherever possible.

He said he has asked governors of those states to review all legislation and practices and remove

any obstacles to lumber production, such as penalties for overloading, and hauling logs on Sunday.

The WPB chairman requested workers and their unions to join in an effort to reduce "excessive wandering from job to job" and halt the movement of skilled workers out of logging areas.

Oregon Grangers Elect Officers

MILWAUKIE, June 19.—(AP)—Morton Tompkins of Dayton was elected master of the Oregon State grange unanimously at the 69th annual convention. He succeeds Ray W. Gill of Portland, master for 10 years, who refused renomination.

La Grande was awarded the 1943 session. Eugene was the only other bidder.

Delegates will have to vote-off three ties—Mrs. Minnie McFarland, Morrow, and Henry Gustafson, Coos, for the third executive committee post; Arthur Hahn, Harney, and Max Kilgel, Multnomah, for the gatekeeper office; Bertha Hanscom, Umatilla, and Ethel Parker, Malheur, Flora. The run-off will be held later.

AN AMAZING OFFER

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with MAJOR HOOPLE

Gloom in Some Allied Quarters Held Unjustified

Setbacks Encountered, But General Trend of War Is Regarded as Favorable

The violence of the fighting in the various theaters of combat, as the axis strains to get its war-machine into top speed for a killing, is producing the usual heavy fluctuations of emotion among the allied people, and for no vital reason there has been a fair amount of gloom knocking about the last day or two.

Without possible doubt we're going to get a lot more of the sweat and blood and tears that British Prime Minister Churchill promised long ago, but there are no present signs that we shall see anything worse than the war already produced. After all, the collapse of France and Belgium, the crimson sands of Dunkerque, the sweep of the Hun forces across the Russian steppes last summer, and Pearl harbor were tough spots.

The allies are encountering some setbacks, but from my observation post the conflict has appeared to be moving along fairly well for our side. We've taken some hard knocks and handed out some but, after all, war is that way, you know. Thus it was with some concern that one read Premier Curtin's gloomy warning to Australians yesterday.

Curtin's Fears Unwarranted

Mr. Curtin said that the news from Libya wasn't good and that the Russian situation held dangers for the allied cause. "Australia is irrevocably linked with the wars in Libya and Russia," he continued, and added that the fall of Australia, a possibility always to be remembered, would open the way for a Japanese attack on Hawaii and the North American coast. This was particularly disturbing since a fortnight earlier the premier declared:

"I defy the enemy to land large forces in Australia. The enemy is being desperately driven to shortages in essential supplies which show themselves more directly in the forces of the axis powers than in the case with the forces of the allied nations. *** And thus time runs against the axis in every theater."

What could have happened in those two weeks to alter the premier's viewpoint so radically? Well, in that time we've knocked the daylight out of the Japs at Midway and have added to this victory in the Aleutians. In fact, in these engagements we inflicted such heavy damage that there's some question whether the nipponese have enough naval strength left to stage a major offensive at sea.

Russians Holding Firm

In that fortnight the Russians have withstood all nazt efforts to get their overdue offensive started. The great soviet naval base of Sevastopol has held in the face of fierce attacks, and today the German dead are piled high before the defenses. The massed Hitlerian assaults in the Kharkov sector at the gateway to the Caucasus have failed to do more than dent the Bolshevik line there—and the reds are showing the

strength to counterattack—stout fellows!

It's true that the news from Libya isn't good. Nazi Marshall Rommel—one of the great generals of this war—has staged a spectacular offensive which today is threatening the important British position at the port of Tobruk. However, the allied forces have been in much worse position in Libya before this. Tobruk has been in axis hands, and even if it should fall now, it's not a matter of despair.

Rommel's gains appear due in large degree to numerical superiority in tanks. However, the British position may be eased by tank reinforcements which they reportedly received as the result of the sensational dash of the big convoy to Tobruk this week.

There undoubtedly are many grave dangers ahead of us, and the crisis calls for every ounce of effort we can give, but taking the situation as a whole there's nothing to cause despair. Personally I like the line given to the French people yesterday by old Marshal Petain:

"I do not lose faith."
