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No More Chiseling

UNCLE SAM, personified in this instance by Leon Henderson, is dead earnest about the new gasoline rationing machinery now being perfected. Whether its use is confined to the eastern seaboard or made nationwide, Mr. Henderson intends to see that there is an end to the sort of chiseling which has been so easy under the temporary system.

The setup is designed to see that weekly allowances are fixed on a basis of actual need, rather than of convenience or mere personal desire.

Having allocated to each motorist what he really is entitled to out of the limited supply, there will be controls over filling stations to assure that the allocations are respected.

This would seem not only equitable, but even necessary if federal rationing agencies are to have the respect of the public.

The need for gasoline rationing in eastern seaboard areas would seem clear, notwithstanding the protests of some who haven't considered the facts.

The need for its extension to the rest of the country is not so convincing, if gasoline alone is considered. But if gasoline rationing is to be used as a method for controlling the unnecessary burning up of rubber—in preference to the more straightforward but very unpleasant alternative of confiscating tires—then obviously Mr. Henderson cannot discriminate against the east.

A set of tires worn out is four times less for the war effort, whether they be used in Maine or in Texas. That, obviously, is the theory on which gas rationing on a 48-state basis is under serious consideration.

Chiseling by motorists and filling stations, such as became too common in the rationed area under the loose temporary system, is selfish and unneighborly if it merely results in the chiseler getting more than his share while others get less.

Chiseling under a rubber-saving program, resulting in unnecessary destruction of our pitifully inadequate rubber stockpile, would be unpatriotic. Some say it would be treasonable. We can't disagree.

Therefore we commend Mr. Henderson for his efforts to make the new system as nearly foolproof as ingenuity can devise. We hope he will put plenty of penalties behind its enforcement. And we hope the motoring public will be patriotic enough so that those penalties will not have to be applied.

Our Time Will Come

FROM Greece come the latest tales of systematic Nazi inhumanity. It is a shocking story. A year ago it would have been blazoned over the front pages of all newspapers, and the skeptical would have asked whether this was like the World War horror stories which were discredited afterward.

By now more's the pity, we have learned that no savagery is too great for the Nazis to perpetrate. Atrocities have been heaped upon atrocities until authenticated accounts have ceased to be sensational news. After Poland, nothing seems worth doubting. Today, because we were unprepared, we can only pity. Tomorrow, all pulling together, we shall be in position to promise to the people of Poland, of Greece, of Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia and France and Scandinavia and the Low Countries that the Yanks are coming, and that those who manage to survive for yet a while shall see retribution exacted for the crimes of which they are victims.

and Tobruk are lost the WAR will be lost. They are important, to be sure, and their fall to the Germans would hurt. But if they are lost, the Russians and the British will fall back to the NEXT defense line and go on fighting. That is war.

THE situation in our own Aleutians remains obscure.

Secretary Stimson tells his press conference the Japs have so far made only a "very small landing." Fog and unfavorable weather, he says, are obscuring developments in the north Pacific.

He promises more news as soon as definite facts are available.

ADMIRAL NIMITZ, at Pearl Harbor, tells us that in the Coral Sea and at Midway we exacted a ten-to-one toll in men and planes against the Japs.

That is important. If we can HOLD that ration, the cooking of the Japanese goose is only a question of time. Holding it, of course, is a bit too much to expect.

NIMITZ adds: "Air power has played a leading role in both the Coral Sea and off Midway and WILL CONTINUE TO DO SO as the war progresses. The Coral Sea was the first time in history in which great aerial duels were fought by carrier fleets."

AMONG historical firsts, recall the battle between the ironclads Merrimac and Monitor, which changed INSTANTLY AND TOTALLY all previous conceptions of naval warfare.

After that epochal contest, wooden warships were as out-of-date as last year's birds' nests. Battleships are beginning to look almost equally out-of-date.

FROM Chungking comes some interesting speculation as to Jap plans to attack Siberia—which, according to "informed quarters" in Chungking, is expected to happen before the summer is over.

The Midway and Aleutian attacks, according to these Chinese sources, were intended to eliminate an attack on the Jap rear if they should tackle Siberia; but the Jap failure there won't necessarily delay the expected Siberian attack.

The main factor there, the Chinese say, is doubt over the course of the German-Russian war. The Japs are believed to have promised Hitler last summer to attack Siberia as soon as Moscow fell, but Moscow didn't fall.

As long as the Russia defenses stand up, the Chinese think the Japs are likely to delay their Siberian plans.

THAT is to say, Hitler will be licked if the Russians hold firm and the canny Japs will want nothing to do with him after he is licked.

"Unlucky" Smith
Of Chisox Loses as
Hit Ball Vanishes

Dom DiMaggio's Swat Hides
Pill in Bull Pen; Dodgers
Down Cardinals by One Run

The unluckiest man in baseball, by all odds, is lefty Edgar Smith of the Chicago White Sox.

After he had lost ten games in a row without winning, the southpaw star thought his tide had turned Sunday when he beat the Washington Senators. He figured he had hit bottom in the game he lost 2-0 to the Philadelphia Athletics although allowing only two hits.

But Smithy learned last night that there are even tougher breaks; the Boston Red Sox beat him 1-0 on a home run when the ball struck under the bull pen at Comiskey park.

Smith waged a magnificent hurling duel with Wagner of the Red Sox, spacing seven hits to Wagner's six. The only difference between the two was that drive by Dominic DiMaggio which rolled out of sight under the bench and couldn't be found till DiMaggio was crossing the plate.

Smith had been beaten twice before 1-0, twice 2-1, once 4-3 and once, of course 2-0. Altogether he has lost six games by one run. Other Highlights Noted.

This dramatic mischance took some of the attention away from the New York Yankees' fourth loss in five games; Paul Waner getting his 3,000th hit; the Brooklyn Dodgers downing the St. Louis Cardinals again; and other sprightly developments.

The Yanks were whipped 5-4 at Cleveland as the veteran Harder pitched four-hit ball, blanking all the Yanks except Dickey (3 hits) and Rizzuto who hit a two-run homer. The Indians were held to five hits by Gomez and Murphy.

Niggling pitched a four-hit shutout as the St. Louis Browns pelted the Philadelphia Athletics 4-0 with a 12-hit attack and Hal White hurled six-hit ball as the Detroit Tigers trimmed the Washington Senators 5-1.

Dodgers Again Down Cards. The Dodgers boosted their National league lead to 6½ games by stopping St. Louis for the second straight time 4-3, Wyatt annexing his seventh triumph against one defeat.

Brooklyn made eight hits, but took command of the game early when Rizzo rifled a two-run homer off Ernie White in the second inning. In the third Reiser stole home for the second time this season.

Waner's entry into a select group of six all-time stars who have made 3,000 hits—Cobb, Speaker, Wagner, Collins, LaJole and Anson, all of them in baseball's hall of fame—proved just an incident in a thrilling 11-inning struggle which the Pittsburgh Pirates captured from the Boston Braves 7-6.

Cincinnati subdued the Phils 6-4 on a three-run homer by Walker, and the New York Giants beat the Chicago Cubs 6-5 after losing the first game of a doubleheader 7-4.
