## NATIONAL AUXILIARY PRESIDENT TO ATTEND STATE CONVENTION



Mrs. Mark W. Murrill, of Scituate, Mass., national president of the American Legion auxiliary, will make her official visit to Oregon during the state convention in Portland the latter part of July.

Mrs. Mark W. Murrill, of Scituate, Mass., was elected to lead the American Legion auxiliary's 520,000 women during the year 1941-1942 at the auxiliary's national convention in Milwaukee, September 15 to 18.

Mrs. Murrill is a member of the American Legion, as well as the American Legion auxiliary, having served as chief petty officer in the naval intelligence bureau during the World War. A brother, James A. Whittaker, also served in the war in the army medical corps.

Mrs. Murrill has been active in the Legion and auxiliary ever since they were formed at the close of the war. A charter member of the American Legion post in Roxbury, Mass., she organized the Roxbury unit of the auxiliary and served as its president for two years. She helped organize the Suffolk county district and for two years was district director.

The department of Massachusetts then selected her as its department secretary, in which office she served for more than seven years. Retiring from this position, she was elected vice-president of the department, then department president. After leading the state organization through a highly successful year, she represented the department of Massachusetts on the national executive committee for two years.

The national organization then called for her services, first as chairman of the national membership committee and later as rehabilitation chairman for the New England states. As chairman of the national publication committee, she directed the publishing of the auxiliary's national magazine. Leaderships of the auxiliary's important national defense program was then entrusted to her, after which she directed the auxiliary's work for disabled veterans as chairman of the national rehabilitation committee. She was completing a year's service in this office at the time of her election.

When the national convention of the auxiliary was held in Boston in 1930, Mrs. Murrill served as convention treasurer, and when the national convention was again held in Boston in 1940, she directed all arrangements as national convention chairman.

When Mrs. Murrill took over the leadership of the auxiliary after her election in Milwaukee, she had behind her 21 years of service in the organization and wide experience in every field of auxiliary work.

## Removal of Interstate Trade Barriers Advised

SALEM, June 23—(AP)—Trade barriers connected with the movement of produce between states should be removed during the war emergency, Dr. P. N. Annand, Washington, D. C., chief of the U. S. bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, said yesterday at the meeting here of the western plant board.

The plant board, including plant quarantine officials of the 11 western states, concludes its meeting today.

Dr. Annand said his department's major problem on the Pacific coast is the inspection of large convoys. He said that his department's quarantine activities are being curtailed because of lack of funds and because the bureau is losing many men to the armed forces.

Former Steinmetz, Portland, army president of the American Association of Nurserymen, said nurserymen favor even more rigid plant quarantine regulations.

## Oregon State Fair Up to Federal Government

SALEM, June 23—(AP)—State Director of Agriculture J. D. Mickle said today that the 1942 state fair would be cancelled if the office of defense transportation makes a direct demand that it be cancelled.

The ODT recommended that all county and state fairs be cancelled this year, but the state board of agriculture, before the ODT request was made, decided to have a greatly curtailed fair, including only 4-H club and Future Farmer exhibits, and horse races.

State Fair Manager Leo Spitzbart said that the fair, in effect, would be a purely local affair, and that the fair probably would not be disapproved by the ODT.

Fair officials, however, must obtain army approval before holding the show.
