Cooper's 10th Win 'is Sixth Shutout; Boston Victim, 4-0

Same Score Sees Dodgers Trim Cincinnati; Lee of Cubs Beats Philadelphia on Five-Hitter

The success story of the year in baseball concerns Morton Cooper of the St. Louis Cardinals, who is most likely to be the National league's starting pitcher in the all-star game in New York July 6.

Cooper captured his 10th victory and sixth shutout yesterday 4-0 with a stunning two-hit performance against the Boston Braves in an army-navy relief game that raised more than \$28,500 at Boston.

It was only the third victory in the last nine games for St. Louis and Cooper won all three with shutouts—stretching a skein of 32 consecutive scoreless innings.

Yesterday he retired the first 16 batters in order and afterward permitted just two singles and one walk.

Dodgers Blank Reds
The Brooklyn Dodgers bashed the Cincinnati Reds 4-0 in a twilight game by rallying for five successive hits after two were out in the third stanza. Losing hurler of the Reds was Starr, who had won 10 games and lost only two previously.

Thompson pitched one-hit ball in relief, but the Reds could make only five hits off Allen.

Bill Lee also pitched five hit ball as the Chicago Cubs cuffed the Phils 7-1 to sweep their three-game series at Philadelphia.

In the American league, the Chicago White Sox shut out the Washington Senators for the second straight game 2-0 in a spectacular hurling duel between Ross and Hudson. The Washington righthander allowed just five hits, one less than his teammates made off Ross, but Chicago wasted only one hit.

Lefty Al Smith of the Cleveland Indians achieved his fourth straight triumph with a five-hit pitching job that stopped the Philadelphia Athletics 4-1. The tribe made good use of seven hits off Wolff.

Detroit downed the Boston Red Sox 7-3 with a six-run rally in the eighth inning.

HOW TO GET WAR DAMAGE INSURANCE

FOR the protection of property-owners after July 1, 1942, war damage insurance will be obtainable through insurance companies under a government-subsidized plan. Beginning July 1, 1942, properties will be covered only upon application and payment of premium as set forth below.

Fire insurance policies do not cover fire losses originating from war, bombing or invasion. These losses must be covered separately as war damage insurance.

War damage insurance under the government plan will be written through agents and brokers, including the Douglas Abstract Co., agents for Oregon Mutual Fire Insurance Co. Policies are written for one year and are non-cancellable. Premiums are payable with application.

Insurance must be carried to an amount at least equal to fifty per cent of the value of the property; except on dwellings, on which any amount desired may be written at the 10% rate. Rates are shown in cents per \$100 of insurance, and the more insurance carried (relative to value of property), the lower the rate per \$100. Example:

Mercantile building, ordinary brick construction, valued at \$20,000:

\$20,000 insurance (100% of value) would cost \$1.25 \$24.00

\$18,000 insurance (90% of value) would cost \$1.10 \$23.40

\$16,000 insurance (80% of value) would cost \$1.00 \$22.40

\$14,000 insurance (70% of value) would cost \$0.90 \$21.40

\$12,000 insurance (60% of value) would cost \$0.80 \$20.40

If insurance is carried to the extent of 90% or 100% of value, it may be written to cover all perils except those under one class, including buildings, contents, and (in the case of dwellings) automobiles, all at the same rate. If less than 90% insurance is carried, a separate amount of insurance must be specified on each building and on its contents.
