Salmon Packers, Labor Union Face U. S. Indictments

PORTLAND, Ore., June 26.—(AP)—Several corporations, individuals and a labor union engaged in salmon fishing and packing have been secretly indicted by a federal grand jury on charges of unlawfully restraining distribution of fresh and canned salmon in interstate commerce.

Included are both Columbia river and Puget sound packers and fishers.

Charles S. Burdell of the department of justice's anti-trust division, in announcing the indictments here, charged that fishermen had enforced demands for arbitrary prices by inducing cannery workers to strike or threaten to strike; that packers had combined to fix and agree upon prices to be paid fishermen to the extent of eliminating competition.

Such practices, he held threatened a vital wartime food supply. Defendants are Columbia River Packers' association of Astoria, Ore.; Columbia River Salmon company, Astoria; Point Adams Packing company, Hammond, Ore.; P. J. McGowan & Son, McGowan, Wash.; New England Fish company, Seattle; Union Fishermen's Protective union, Astoria; Edward Thompson of Columbia River Packers; Arthur Anderson, president of the Columbia River Salmon company; Lawrence Rogers, president of Point Adams Packing company; Henry Barbey; Henry Goodrich, Astoria, manager of the New England company; Alfred Gile, president of the Chinook company; Frithoff Kankkonen, manager, and Henry Niemela, secretary of the Protective union.

Mrs. E. McElwain Dies in Roseburg

Mrs. Elizabeth McElwain, 81, well known resident of Roseburg, died suddenly at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Beatrice M. Linser, North Pine street, Friday afternoon. Born Feb. 9, 1861 at Iowa City, Iowa, Mrs. McElwain was married in that city in 1880 to Charles S. McElwain, who died about two years ago. Mrs. McElwain came to Douglas from Roundup, Mont., in 1930 and had made her home with her daughter here for the last five years.

Surviving her, besides her daughter, are three sons, P. N. McElwain, Portland; C. S. McElwain, Seattle; and Charles F. McElwain, Bucoda, Wash.; also ten grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Douglas Funeral home Monday at 2 p. m., under the auspices of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, of which Mrs. McElwain was a member. The body will then be taken to Eugene for cremation.

C. P. (Bud) Lewis, Former Roseburg Painter, Dies

Crawford P. (Bud) Lewis, 79, native of Dillard, Or., died Friday at Springfield, Or., where he had resided the last 16 years. With exception of that period, he spent his life in Douglas county, chiefly in Roseburg. Surviving are his widow, nee Minnie Fanning, to whom he was married February 1, 1891, and a daughter, Mrs. Velma Stone, of Springfield.

The body was brought to Roseburg for the funeral service, which will be held at the Roseburg Undertaking parlors Monday afternoon at 1:30, the pastor of the Baptist church officiating. Interment will follow in Masonic cemetery.

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Youth Fined, Jailed for Traffic Law Breaking

Alleged to have used a fictitious name to avoid penalty for arrest on a charge of operating a truck without proper lights, Lawrence Ivan Gates, 19, of Roseburg was fined \$50 on two counts and was sentenced to 10 days in jail following appearance in the local justice court today.

Justice of the Peace Ira B. Riddle reported that Gates was halted recently by state police and charged with improper truck lights and was cited to appear in court. He gave the name of Charles Stevenson and exhibited a driver's license in that name. Judge Riddle said. He failed to appear and it was not until a later date that his true identity was learned, when he was taken into custody and also charged with operating a motor vehicle without an operator's license.

Ninth Member of Patten Family Enlists in Navy

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27.—(AP)—The navy gained another member of its largest family last night—Wayne Patten, 18, who followed his father and seven brothers into service.

The youngest son of the Ridgefield, Wash., family, formerly of Iowa, was sworn in at Portland's largest mass military induction, in which 956 recruits joined up, all but 65 of them with the navy.

The other Pattens were on hand. They were Clarence Patten, the father, now in the navy recruiting service here, and his seven other sons, all survivors of the Lexington: Clarence, Jr., Ray, Bruce, Marvin, Allen, Gilbert and Myrre.

Rulers of Britain Hobnob With U. S. Troops in Ireland

WITH THE UNITED STATES FORCES IN NORTHERN IRELAND, June 27.—(AP)—United States troops from almost all states seemed pretty well agreed today that Queen Elizabeth is "a swell girl" after putting on a show for the king and queen which drew congratulations from the king because of its "impressive efficiency."

Demonstrating everything from bridge-building to doughnut-making, the American soldiers staged an all-out mock battle for the royal visitors on their three-day trip to northern Ireland. Their majesties rode in jeeps and tanks, and examined guns, gas masks and field kitchens.

When it was all over the king asked Maj. Gen. Russell P. Hartle, commander of American forces in northern Ireland, to convey to the troops his "heartiest congratulations on the impressive efficiency" with which the demonstration and operations were performed.

The queen stepped up to Sergt. Reuben Krage of Elyria, O., and asked him about his howitzer. "It's a beautiful weapon," the sergeant told the queen, adding later:

"She's a swell girl. She talked like she knew something about guns."

During one demonstration, the queen stepped up to Sergt. John Murray of Des Moines and asked if she could talk over the hand radio he was carrying.

"Hey, here's a young lady you may have heard of who wants to talk to you," the sergeant yelled into the microphone. Private Earle T. Teague of Statesville, N. C., on the other end, then talked with the queen.

George Hedrick, Native Of Drain, Passes at 83

George Hedrick, 83, pioneer resident of Drain and Douglas county, died at his home west of Drain Friday after a short illness.

He was born in Drain Jan. 12, 1859, and lived near there continuously. He was married to Miss Susan Putnam July 14, 1887. Mrs. Hedrick died March 12, 1942. He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Maud H.
