Ex-Nazi Consul In U. S. Believed Commanding Sub

CLEARWATER, Fla., June 29. (AP)—Baron Edgar von Spiegel, World war 1 U-boat commander and later German consul at New Orleans, may be operating one of the submarines harassing allied nations' shipping in the Caribbean area, according to the story told by an army lieutenant.

Lieut. John Paxon, survivor of a torpedoed ship, said the commander of the submarine which sank his boat introduced himself to a life boat full of survivors as von Spiegel, speaking in perfect English.

Other reports of von Spiegel's presence in the Caribbean area have been received, but nothing so definite as Paxon's report. Von Spiegel has a thorough knowledge of the gulf coast area through his peace-time activities.

He remained in the United States until all consulates of Germany were ordered closed. He left supposedly for home via South America.

Frequently in print, von Spiegel probably drew the most attention two years ago when he was quoted as saying that "Germany will not forget that when she was waging a struggle for her very life that the United States did everything in its power to aid her enemies."

The statement was quoted by a New Orleans reporter, and brought a call from Louisiana Governor Sam Jones for a state department investigation. The baron later was called to Washington.

Item for Price Chief Slashed in New War Measure

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(AP)—The house appropriations committee fired another financial salvo in the war program today, sending to the floor a \$1,810,487, 615 supply bill which it estimated would boost to approximately \$228,000,000 the amount projected for national defense since June 1940.

The new bill carries funds for almost a score of war agencies for the fiscal year starting July 1. Most of them have been operating in the past on emergency allocations.

While more than one-half the total, \$1,100,000,000, is for war shipping administration, a \$75,000,000 item for Leon Henderson's office of price administration was expected to be the only part of the bill over which a controversy of any consequence would develop.

The committee more than halved Henderson's original request and shaved \$86,000,000 from the budget bureau's recommendation. To make certain the \$75,000,000 would be all that Henderson's agency would have to spend during the new year, the committee wrote into the bill a restriction that the OPA funds "shall not be augmented by allocations of transfers of funds from any other appropriation."

The OPA item was almost certain to bring into the open the resentment that has been smoldering in some congressional quarters since Henderson began appointing state administrators without consulting the patronage views of capitol hill. House economy bloc leaders promptly announced they would seek to cut the \$75,000,000 at least in half.

"Snoopers" Prohibited
The committee wrote into the OPA section a ban against "the purchase of evidence of violations of the law." This, committee members said, was intended to prohibit the employment of paid "snoopers."

It also included a prohibition against making public any information obtained by the office of emergency management in inspections, examinations or reports concerning business.

Elsewhere in its report and published hearings, the committee made these disclosures:

Government expenditures for war purposes soon will near \$6,000,000,000 a month and require the employment of between 60 and 65 per cent of the nation's industry.

Production of aviation gasoline is at least 50 per cent higher than the maximum which had been believed possible several months ago.

At a cost of approximately \$600,000 each, the public roads administration is building 28 airplane landing strips along the coast in connection with aircraft operations against submarines and for use as auxiliary and emergency landing fields. Publishers and broadcasters, according to Censorship Director Byron Price, are giving "excellent" cooperation in the voluntary censorship program.
