Nazis Claim Warships of Britain, Russia Sunk

BERLIN (from German broadcasts) June 30.—(AP)—Seven-teen united nations war and merchant ships have been sunk in the past 24 hours, the German radio said today.

Included were one British warship which went down in the Bay of Bengal and one soviet motor torpedo boat in the Gulf of Finland. The other 15 were sunk in the western Atlantic, the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean sea.

Oregon's Civilian Defense Enlarged By 2 New Units

SALEM, June 30.—(AP)—Creation of two new units of the civilian defense organization was announced today by State Civilian Defense Coordinator Jerrold Owen.

The U. S. citizens service corps will include those working in such activities as consumers' interest, salvage, recreation, war savings, education, health, nutrition, transportation and other types of community war work carried on with the approval of the state defense council.

The civilian defense auxiliary group will include persons who, because of their civil occupations, should be eligible to be on the streets and perform their duties during blackouts and air raids.

Special insignia will be provided for members of each group. The new units are in addition to regular civilian defense activities.

Members of the service corps must complete prescribed courses, and must have completed 50 hours of work in a position approved by the county defense council if no specific training course is required.

Persons who may be included in the auxiliary group include: Doctors, registered nurses, members of the clergy, newspaper reporters, press photographers, news reel cameramen, operators of essential transportation facilities, telegraph messengers, telephone and telegraph operators, representatives of humane societies, and undertakers.

County defense councils will have the primary responsibility for determining classes and numbers of persons in each community entitled to be included in the auxiliary corps.

Dodgers Rally in Ninth To Defeat Philadelphia

(By the Associated Press) Leo Durocher, chief of the Brooklyn Dodgers has been fined \$50 and suspended for three days by President Frick of the National league for his run-in with the umpires Sunday.

But he was within whispering distance at Philadelphia last night as the Brooklyn pestered another half game to their National league lead in one of the day's two major league games. His charges came through with a six-run outburst in the ninth inning to quell the Philadelphia Phils, 10 to 3.

In the American league the Cleveland Indians retained third place by shelling the Chicago White Sox, 11 to 5.

JAPS CLAIM GAIN ALONG VITAL CHINESE RAILWAY

(By the Associated Press) Fighting in a torrential rain-storm, Japan's invasion armies were reported in a Tokyo broadcast to have gained another 20 miles in a two-day drive along the vital Chekiang-Kiang railway in eastern China today.

The broadcast said that three Chinese armies were retreating southward from the Chinese-held strip of the railway and that Japanese spearheads now were only about 30 miles apart.

said the invaders were still 50 miles apart, but implied that a new phase on the battle was about to start. Commenting that it was difficult to predict what the Japanese would do next, the spokesman said possibly they would try to invade coastal Fukien province in a further attempt to eliminate air bases from which Japan could be bombed.

The spokesman said fighting northward on the Shansi-Honan border was "very complicated," with three Japanese columns attacking the Chinese from Shansi and three from Honan.

JAP FLIERS DODGED FIGHT AT TOKYO, RAIDERS STATES

PORTLAND, June 30.—(AP)—A heavy anti-aircraft barrage met the U. S. army airmen who bombed Tokyo April 18, but Japanese pursuit pilots flying high overhead did not offer to fight, Lieut. Dean Davenport said last night.

Davenport, one of the raiders, said the Nipponese pilots stayed at a high altitude, watching the bombers as they skimmed over rooftops.

He told a reporter his plane dropped four bombs and a cluster of incendiaries on the Japanese capital.

"All were hits on machinery and steel works just south of the imperial palace. In fact we used the palace for a pylon," he added.

"I'd like to see Tokyo again that way. The people were panic stricken," Davenport said.
