Umpqua S.-L. Assn. Celebrates Its 25th Anniversary

The directors, officers and employees of the Umpqua Savings and Loan association, together with their wives, celebrated the 25th anniversary of the organization at a dinner at the Umpqua hotel last night. Guy Cordon acted as toastmaster and principal talks were made by S. J. Shoemaker, M. E. Ritter, H. O. Pargeter and Carl E. Wimberly. Discussions relative to the operation of the association brought out a number of interesting facts. It was known that during the 25 years of operation the association has received approximately four million dollars; that loans aggregating more than two million dollars were made on Douglas county property and a total of \$659,683.69 collected as interest and distributed to expense, earnings and reserves. The fact that the association has had the lowest operating cost per dollar of investment, year after year, would indicate a very satisfactory management. At the present time, it was reported, only four per cent of the total assets are carried under the item of "property owned."

Reserve Fund Upped
The directors, it was stated, have voted a four per cent dividend to be credited July 1 and more than the usual amount will be added to the reserves, as the members of the board feel that the reserve fund should be substantially increased due to present conditions. More than \$25,000 will be distributed to dividends and reserves.

Reports also showed \$5,000 invested in Series C war bonds. All employees are buying bonds under the payroll deduction plan, and H. O. Pargeter, secretary of the association, is serving as county chairman in promoting the sale of war bonds and stamps.

More than 90 per cent of all new construction loans during the last 10 years have been made by this association, according to a review of operations. Total assets, as of July 1, will be approximately \$600,000. Loans made during the year ending June 30, 1942, show an increase of approximately 25 per cent over the like period of last year. Although there has been considerable reduction of loan applications during the past two months, due to building restrictions, loans during the year amounted to approximately \$100,000.

The first president of the association was Lee Wimberly, who served from 1917 to 1921. E. N. Ewart was president from 1921 to 1934. A. G. Sutherland, 1934 to 1935. S. J. Shoemaker 1935 to the present time. Jos. Micelli was treasurer from 1917 to 1924 and his son, V. J. Micelli, has served as treasurer since 1924. The first attorney for the association was George Neuner. He was followed by Carl E. Wimberly, then by Wimberly and Cordon and now Cordon and Keohane.

A salary of \$15 per month to the secretary, H. O. Pargeter, is the only salary paid by the association, as no other officers receive compensation.

Small Fairs in Walking Distance May Be Okayed

NEWPORT, Ore., June 30.—(AP)—Small community fairs, within walking distance of local exhibitors, may replace Oregon county fairs called off because of the gas and rubber shortages.

Harry Seymour, state 4-H club leader, disclosed that possibility here, adding that complete plans are being studied by Governor Sprague.

The plans call for winning exhibits to be sent to Salem for final judging, even if the state fair is called off, he said.

Circus All Set For Performance Here Tonight

While Roseburg residents slept undisturbed in their beds last night, the Russell Bros three-ring circus, one of America's largest, moved into town from Medford and with no perplexing delays this morning started the erection of an entertainment city of gleaming white canvas on Bel-lows field for one performance tonight at 8 o'clock.

The men, women and children who assembled on the grounds this morning to watch the ever-alluring spectacle of erecting the tent city witnessed a free show which to many is as interesting as the actual circus performance. One by one the huge vans pulled onto the lot and discharged their cargoes.

Ponderous elephants lumbered from their wagons, shaggy-haired camels and South American llamas alighted and stretched after their 110-mile move, while sleek horses and pert Shetland ponies pranced in the sunshine awaiting the erection of the menagerie tent.

Laborers set to work hoisting poles, spreading canvas, driving stakes, and performing a multitude of other duties incidental to erecting the various tents—the sideshow of freaks and human oddities, living and dressing tents, menagerie, and the all-important dining tent in which nearly 1200 meals are served daily to the large circus family of some

400 performers, workers and technicians.

All's Ready for Show.

Finally the big top, one of the largest spreads of canvas on the road, nosed into the air and by late afternoon everything was in readiness for tonight's performance. Doors to the menagerie will be opened at 7 o'clock giving Roseburg circus fans an entire hour to see all the animals before the start of the big show.

Crowning features of the two-hour program include Jorger. M. Christiansen and his world-famous South African Criollo liberty horses, Wiston's equestrian sea lions performing incredible feats of balance and jugglery on cantering ponies, and the Seven Skyrocketing Escalantes presenting the absolute climax to all aerial achievements.

Lovers of animals will thrill at John White's championship leaping greyhounds, Marce and her canine pals, the only troupe of trained Great Danes on the road, Pauline Webb's dancing horses and military ponies, and Captain Alvir Welsh's performing elephants.

Additional thrills are provided by the Aerial Alexandros, a comical contingent of clowns, and the Orton, Acevado, Freehand, Olvera, Clarke, and Bell-Thazer troupes of jugglers, head-balancers, acrobats, tumblers and wire-walkers.
