Coleslaw with Diced Apple and Green Pepper
Buttered Rye Bread Slabs of Cheese

KIDNEY BEANS WITH SPARERIBS

1 1/2 lbs. spareribs cut in 2-4 lb. pieces
1 tsp. shortening
3/4 cup finely chopped onion
1 cup salt
1 1/2 cups meat stock
3/4 cup finely chopped beans
2 cups cooked kidney beans

Brown spareribs in hot shortening in heavy frying pan. Add onion and garlic; cook about 3 minutes, stirring frequently. Place spareribs in casserole. Combine meat stock (or 2 bouillon cubes dissolved in 1 1/2 cups boiling water), seasonings, and beans; pour over spareribs; cover. Bake in slow oven (325° F.) about 1 hour or until spareribs are tender. Serves 6.
