Fuel Oil Restrictions in Northwest to Be Lifted

LOS ANGELES, July 3.—(AP)—A federal petroleum marketing official predicts early suspension of fuel oil restrictions in Oregon and Washington.

C. S. Beesmyer, chairman of the District No. 5 marketing committee of the office of petroleum coordinator for war, said a war production board order was expected "in a few days." He said the industry had made every effort to move the maximum of oil into Oregon and Washington. "The chief purpose of lifting the restrictions," he reported, "would be to permit filling of all consumers' fuel tanks to meet the needs of the coming winter."

Roseburg Rifle Unit to Be Mustered in Tonight

Arrangements have been made for the muster into the state guard service tonight of Company A, 17th battalion, the Roseburg rifle unit. The company will be assembled at the Roseburg armory, under the command of Captain S. C. Dunn.

Tiller-Trail Area Scene Of Small Forest Fire

The first forest fire of the season on the Umpqua national forest burned over about two acres in the Tiller-Trail summit area in the South Umpqua district late Thursday, V. V. Harpham, supervisor, reported today. The fire started from sparks from the Johnson mill, Harpham stated, and burned through a slash area without causing serious damage. Portable pumps from the Tiller ranger station and from the mill aided mill and forest service crews in quickly bringing the blaze under control.

Harry Hopkins to Wed Fashion Authority

NEW YORK, July 3.—(AP)—Mrs. Louise Macy, attractive fashion authority and former Paris editor of Harper's Bazaar, said today that she and Harry Hopkins, presidential aide, would be married in about a month.

Mrs. Macy said that she met Hopkins about six months ago through mutual friends.

Hopkins, 52, lives at the White House, as does his daughter Diana.

He now is lend-lease supervisor and member of the war production board and has been sitting in at presidential conferences with representatives of the United Nations.

It will be Hopkins' third marriage. He was separated by divorce from his first wife, by whom he had three children, and his second wife, Mrs. Barbara Duncan Hopkins, mother of Diana, died October 7, 1937.

Mrs. Macy is 36.

Bill Permits States to Tax U. S. Military Sites

WASHINGTON, July 3.—(AP)—The senate passed and sent to

the house yesterday a measure permitting states to levy regular taxes against property acquired by the government since January, 1942, or obtained in the future for general military purposes.

Senator McNary of Oregon, the minority leader, said similar measures were in effect during the last war.

The bill would authorize state taxation of real property taken over for camps, bomb testing areas and other installations at the rate previously charged against it.
