Never has a greater obligation rested upon the church to vindicate and cultivate worship than today. In an age obsessed with material aims and mistaking entertainment for recreation, the church owes it to society to demonstrate the spiritual reinvigoration that lies in worship as an exercise and expression of the noblest powers of the human spirit and an opening of the soul to the entrance of the divine spirit. The church is failing to meet this obligation and opportunity as is evident on every hand. Worship is both an impulse and an art. It is an art because it is an impulse which requires expression in some degree commensurate with its object. Since it is an art it must be cultivated just as any art must be in order to accomplish its purpose. The root trouble is carelessness. The careless conduct of worship is not only a defect which is alienating many of the best minds from the church, but a sin against the spirit which should be repented of in works meet for repentance. To lead a congregation in prayer is a sacrament, yet many prayers are not only without form, but void, void of content of the spirit of prayer and of relation to the deeper desires and needs of the congregation and human kind. The pastoral prayer should be vicarious. Too often it is self-centered. The pastoral prayer is indeed the acme of worship. Amen.
