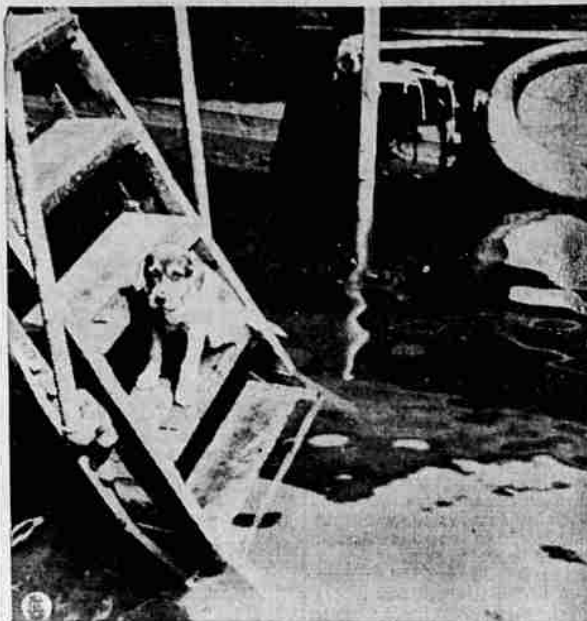

Former Reedsport Lumberman Passes

PORTLAND, Ore., July 7.—(AP)—George B. Maxwell, Oregon-Washington lumberman of note, died at his Gearhart, Ore., home last night.

He was a native of Portland and was in the lumber business in Aberdeen for many years before returning here with the West Coast Lumber company during world war I. Later he established retail yards in southern California and resided in Pasadena. More recently he was manager of the Winchester Bay Lumber company at Reedsport and at the time of death was connected with the Youngs Bay Lumber company at Warrenton. His widow survives.

Mrs. Voyt Wins in Appeal From Damage Award

A circuit court decision, appealed from Multnomah county, was decided in the supreme court today in favor of Mrs. Natalie Voyt, resident of Roseburg, who brought suit against the Bekins Moving and Storage company for damages allegedly resulting from the loss of valuable silverware in transit. The circuit court decided in favor of Mrs. Voyt and the decision was sustained by the state supreme court in an opinion by Justice James T. Brand, with Justices Rossman, Rand and Lusk dissenting.

Hours Fixed For Applications For Tires and Tubes

Applications will be received and certificates issued for tires, tubes and recaps only during the hours from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m., it was announced today from the local office of the rationing board. The office hours will be strictly observed, according to R. L. Preston, executive secretary, and work will not be conducted at any other time.

It is necessary, Preston states, that the individual filing the application must sign the certificate personally and take it to the tire dealer. In the case of a governmental agency or department, a corporation or partnership, however, the application and certificate may be signed by a duly authorized officer or agent.

The board is in receipt of a bulletin stating that in some cases an applicant may have a fairly good tire which the tire inspector approves for replacement with a new or retreaded tire. Instead of turning in the inspected tire, however, he turns in a used carcass, which is in much poorer condition than the tire originally inspected. Such practice, the bulletin states, is obviously in violation of both the letter and spirit of tire regulations.

It is instructed that future applications must carry the serial number of the tire actually inspected and that the tire exchanged must bear the corresponding number. Furthermore, it is directed that every tire inspection certificate must show the exact condition of the tires which have been inspected and, in addition, the speed at which such tires may be safely driven.

The board further announced today that no applications for sugar for canning will be received until after July 16.

Stop-Gap Bill For Farm Dept. Passed

WASHINGTON, July 7.—(AP)—The house passed and returned to the senate today stop-gap legislation to provide funds for operations of the Agriculture department during July.

The action came after the members abandoned, temporarily, their previous stands for prohibitions against below-parity sales of government-held grain stocks, in the interest of obtaining agreement with the senate on legislation which would give the department operating funds for the first time since last Wednesday.

By a roll call vote announced as 185 to 59, the members defeated a motion by Chairman Cannon (D-Mo) of the appropriations committee to insist that the senate agree to the prohibition which President Roosevelt and administration leaders have opposed.

Speakers made it plain during debate, however, that they intended to insist on their position in negotiations on the department's new appropriation, yielding only on the question of giving the department funds on which to operate during July.

Cannon accused the agriculture department of "trying to break down farm prices."

Czech Flier Bags Total Of 22 German Planes

LONDON, July 7.—(AP)—Flight Lieut. Charles Kuttelwascher, the RAF's Czech night fighter ace who specializes in hovering over German airdromes in occupied France and Belgium and shooting down returning German bombers, was awarded a star today for the distinguished flying officer's medal he received five weeks ago.

Since then, it was disclosed, "Kuttel" has shot down 12 more unwary Germans, bringing his total to 22.

Hitler's Drive for Caucasus Carries Warning to Allies

The weight and fierceness of Hitler's mammoth offensive against the Russians in the Kursk-Kharkov sector give us blunt warning of the dangers which the allies must surmount during the next few crucial months.

It is, of course, a matter of grave concern that the nazis have bludgeoned their way 120 miles eastward to the Don river, thus threatening the gateway to the Caucasus. But this great advance, which carries the invaders fifty miles deeper into soviet territory than they got in their all-out drive last year, should cause neither surprise nor despair.

Hitler is flinging one million men—a colossal force—against the bolshevik positions in the valley of the upper Don. He is making a wholesale sacrifice of life in an effort to wash out his past failures with the blood of Germany's youth.

Now when you get that much pressure, and that kind of pressure, thrown against any battle line, something has to break. Man for man the Russians probably are better fighters than the Germans, but there's no such thing as an invincible superman. We must expect Russian reverses during the furious fighting which is ahead of us, and it's best that we adjust ourselves to that viewpoint. This recognition of facts shouldn't blunt our belief that the allies will keep Hitler out of the Caucasus and the middle east for which he is striving.

Hitler's Aims Apparent

The Hitlerian strategy is plain enough. His offensive is calculated (1) to sever Russia's communications with the Caucasus, thereby cutting the reeds off from vital oil and food supplies, and (2) to swing a great army across the entrance to the Caucasian isthmus, ready for an assault southward to the oil fields and the middle east. Berlin already claims the capture of the city of Voronezh, an important railway junction near the upper Don. If this is true it would sever the last main line between Moscow and Rostov—a hard blow to the Russians. The nazi chief also must envisage the capture of the big industrial city of Stalingrad on the Volga (use your maps please) Andastrakhan, which lies near the mouth of the Volga on the Caspian sea.

You will note that should fortune favor him to that extent he then would be holding a line right across the top of the isthmus running between the Black and Caspian seas. But there his troubles would be only well under way, for in order to drive down through this isthmus he must force the lofty Caucasus mountain range, which is one of the most formidable military barriers in the world. And south of those peaks he presumably would come up against American and British forces.

Well, it doesn't seem necessary to carry the fuhrer any farther at the moment along the road to the golden oil on which he hopes to float to glory. There's another aspect of this situation which often is overlooked, and this is that the northern Caucasus for which Hitler is headed represents one of Russia's principal food sources.
