Wainwright Surrendered To Former Classmate

BERKELEY, Calif., July 8.—(AP)—When Corregidor fell, Gen. Jonathan L. Wainwright surrendered personally to a Ja-

panese officer who had been his classmate in the U. S. military academy at West Point, Jan.

recently escaped from Hongkong, said today. The Japanese officer appointed Gen. Wainwright "boss" of the

prison camp for American soldiers at Baguio, Marston said. Marston said it "is only a matter of months" until Gen. Doug-
