U. S. Naval Heroes Sacrifice Selves To Save Wounded

SAN FRANCISCO, July 10.—(AP)—Making room for the wounded, U. S. navy men leaped overboard from over-crowded whaleboats and sacrificed their lives in the battle of the Coral sea, it was disclosed here by two survivors of the U. S. naval tanker Neosho.

The story of gallantry was related by E. A. Flaherty, 22, electrician's mate, 3rd class, St. Louis, Mo., and by D. J. Nelson, 22, signalman, 3rd class, Laurel, Mont. They were on the Neosho when she was blasted by Japanese bombs last May 5. Flaherty related that all hands were ordered to abandon ship, and the whaleboats were launched.

When it became evident that there would not be room for everyone in the two boats, a naval reserve lieutenant, Henry K. Bradford, ordered the uninjured out of the boats to make places for the wounded.

"He led the way himself," said Flaherty, "plunging into the water and grabbing a towline on the boat."

Eventually, the lieutenant and some of the enlisted men of those who leaped were saved, but the others—about a dozen—swam until they sank from exhaustion, or were killed by the sharks, for which the Coral sea is notorious.

Rescue was five days in coming. It came in the shape of a U. S. destroyer which picked up the survivors and torpedoed the derelict Neosho, which was still afloat.

Flaherty was among the injured. He was burned about the face and upper body. Nelson was unhurt, but did not leap overboard because he had been placed in charge of one of the whaleboats and ordered to man it.

Aircraft Unions Ask Wage Boosts Up to 50 Perct.

LOS ANGELES, July 10.—(AP)—AFL and CIO representatives submitted joint demands to a government conference yesterday for aircraft industry wage increases ranging as high as 50 per cent.

Union and management are conferring with government advisors on blanket increases covering the entire industry. Such a wage scale would affect more than a million workers if applied on a national scale.

Demands of the International Association of Machinists (AFL) and the United Automobile Workers (CIO) included a minimum of 95 cents an hour for unskilled labor, compared with the prevailing 60 cents. They ranged upward through skilled categories to a minimum of \$1.60 for certain employees now paid \$1.52.

Both the CIO and AFL contend that there must be an increase in aircraft wages or shipyard workers and other lucrative war trades will pull workers away. Management representatives have expressed willingness to consider pay raises, but today's figures were the first submitted.

Veiled Warning Issued The CIO-United Automobile Workers simultaneously issued this statement:

"If the results of this conference do not provide the necessary relief then the UAW-CIO views with alarm the reaction of the aircraft workers."

Asking that stabilization be placed on a national instead of a regional basis, it asserted: "We submit that the shipyards on the west coast are not the only competing force for manpower."

"All the workers employed in the manufacture of airplanes and airplane parts on the west coast look to this conference for relief from sub-standard wages."

Accompanying the wage demands was a joint statement from labor leaders that their policy provided that all workers remain in their present jobs pending outcome of the conference, and that there shall be no strike or slowdown in defense industries for duration of the war.

The unions also requested establishment of joint labor-management committees in each plant as a means of speeding up production.

Foundry Workers Defer Proposed Strike Vote

SEATTLE, July 9.—(AP)—Members of the Molders and Foundry Workers' union who tied up Seattle foundries yesterday to meet for a vote on the issue of asking strike sanction from the AFL international did not take the vote but decided to leave the wage situation stand until July 20.

A committee announced last night the molders decided to give employers until the 20th to meet wage demands, or, if the problem of negotiation is not settled by the war labor board, the group will then hold another meeting for a possible strike sanction vote. The vote yesterday was unanimous, the committee reported.

Charles Olson, union chairman, said after the meeting the molders want the public to "understand that we're as patriotic as anyone and that we want to do everything in our power to win the war, but we feel that all the patriotism shouldn't be on one side."

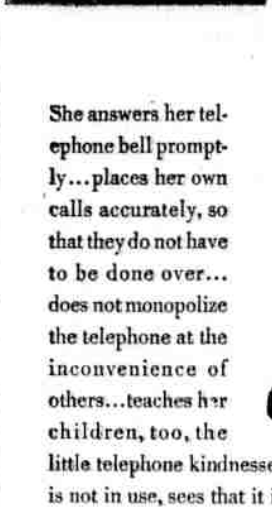
