Test Slated For Air Raid Sirens

A test of the city's air raid alarm sirens will be made at 12 noon Wednesday, July 15, it was announced today by R. L. Gile, civilian defense commander. The protective jackets will be removed from the sirens and other adjustments made in an effort to increase volume. Listeners will be posted in all parts of the city to determine where "blind" spots exist.

It has been definitely decided, Mr. Gile states, to leave the sirens in their present location atop the city hall. This is to be done, he states, to eliminate a great deal of expense in making installations at a considerable distance from the control center.

However, if tests indicate that certain areas are not protected, arrangements will be worked out whereby firemen and fire watchers with sirens on automobiles will be assigned to such unprotected districts to give warning.

McClain Returns From Banking School Session

E. S. McClain, manager of the Roseburg branch of the U. S. National bank, has returned to his home here after attending his second resident session at the graduate school of banking, held annually at Rutgers university, New Brunswick, N. J., under sponsorship of the American Bankers association.

Mr. McClain left Roseburg June 3, stopping briefly at San Francisco, Los Angeles, New Orleans, St. Augustine and New York city. Much of the school session, he reports, was given over to study of war and post-war financing problems.

The course to which Mr. McClain was elected last year covers two years of study by correspondence, and includes three resident sessions at the university. He plans to return for his final session next year, providing transportation facilities are still available.

New Long-Range Bomber Makes First Test Flight

SEATTLE, July 11.—(AP)—A new long-range experimental flying craft, built as a heavily armed overseas patrol bomber for the navy, made its first test flight over Lake Washington yesterday.

Built by the Boeing Aircraft Company, which originated and now builds the flying fortress bombers for the army, the ship was described as able to carry a larger bomb load than any naval plane now in use. Its engines are believed to be the most powerful aircraft power plants now built anywhere.

Boeing said the ship was "designed as long range scouting and bombing plane, capable of hunting out and destroying enemy submarines and surface vessels." It is of all-metal construction and has living accommodations for a 10-man crew.

Open Campfires After Dark Taboo In Umpqua Forest

No open campfires after dark will be permitted within the Umpqua National forest, except in those areas where provision is made for immediate receipt of air raid warning signals, it was announced today from the local office of the Umpqua National forest. Instructions were received today from the headquarters of General John L. DeWitt, commander of the western defense area, prohibiting open fires except in cases where they can be extinguished immediately upon receipt of air raid warning.

The announcement from local forest headquarters calls attention to the fact that this order affects designated forest camps where campfire permits ordinarily are not required. Since most of these camps do not have reasonable air raid warning service, it will be necessary that all open fires be extinguished as soon as it becomes dark, and no fires will be permitted during the night. Warning fires or bonfires should not be built, it is stated, and

campfires should be restricted to small cooking fires. In camps where air raid warning service is available, fires may burn after dark, but provision must be made to extinguish them promptly in the event of raid warning being received.

Non-Resident Game Law Affects Military Men

SALEM, July 11.—(AP)—Oregon's non-resident game laws apply to soldiers, sailors and marines as well as to other citizens, Attorney General Van Winkle ruled today in an opinion requested by the state game commission.

The commission wanted to know if members of the armed forces were eligible for resident hunting and fishing licenses without having resided in the state six months as ordinarily required. Van Winkle said "no."
