

Yanks Boost Lead By Beating Tigers As Indians Lose

The New York Yankees beat down the Detroit Tigers again yesterday 4-3 and the Washington Senators surprisingly shut out the Cleveland Indians 7-0 in a night game.

These results, coming as they did on the heels of the Boston Red Sox' double somersault before the St. Louis Browns Sunday, placed an emphatic damper on whatever American league rivals were rash enough to think the world champions were collapsing.

All season long Detroit has been the most troublesome of the Yanks' opponents and the Tigers were tough to handle yesterday even though lefty Gomez held them to four hits and fanned seven while going the route for the second time this year.

The Cleveland Indians, who had won four straight and 11 of their last 14 (excluding a tie), meanwhile suffered a jolt at the nation's capital and saw their third place distance from the leaders swell to seven games.

Masterson was the No. 1 boy for the Senators, holding Cleveland to three scattered singles while his teammates pelted three pitchers for ten hits.

In the only other game, the Philadelphia Athletics nosed out the Chicago White Sox 4-3 in 11 innings. Marchildon allowed Chicago just eight hits and he started the winning rally in the 11th with a single after two were out.

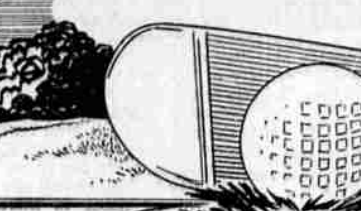

Chain Stores Permitted to Continue Price Policy

WASHINGTON, July 14.—(AP)—The office of price administration took action yesterday to permit chain stores having an established uniform price policy to continue that policy under the universal price ceiling.

Under the original price order each store in a chain was regarded as a separate seller and its ceiling prices were determined by the highest prices charged in March.

New stores which did not deal in a particular article in March, however, have been required to base their ceiling prices on the prices of similar commodities or on the prices of closely competitive stores. This resulted in wide price variations among stores, OPA said.

Under the new amendment, OPA will permit chains to apply for the use of uniform maximum prices in all units of the chain, if this procedure has been followed in the past.

Demands for Wage Increases Doomed

LOS ANGELES, July 14.—(AP)—The government served notice to aircraft workers yesterday that there will be no wage increases except to eliminate inequality and sub-standards of living.

Richard Gilbert, deputy administrator of the office of price administration, said at a aircraft wage stabilization conference that wage increases "for any other reason are inconsistent" with President Roosevelt's program.

He made the statement after the AFL and CIO, in a joint announcement, attacked the government proposal to freeze wages, and said the plan "threatens to substitute decisions by government boards for free collective agreements and to dictate a policy of no wage increases."

Gilbert told the labor-management conference that profits of the war plane industry "are not normal profits," but are "created by the war demands of the government."

"In view of the fact that the average wages in the airplane industry are above the average wages in this area and in the country as a whole," he said, "the rate can hardly be considered sub-standard."

WASHINGTON, July 14.—(AP)—Well-placed labor board sources said today the dollar-a-day wage increase demanded by "little steel" is out and a sum closer to 50 cents, more or less, is in prospect.

The board was not expected to vote before Thursday or Friday, but the discussions have been extensive enough to permit the preparation of tentative opinions by the four public members. Under security in the form of a maintenance of membership clause was regarded as a certainty by persons close to the board who declined quotation by names.
