Dr. Edwards Keeps Letters Going to Men Overseas

Scores of Douglas county men, now in the armed services of the United States are corresponding regularly with Dr. C. A. Edwards, retired Methodist minister of Roseburg. Dr. Edwards formed personal acquaintance with many of the men while serving as chairman of the county selective service board and has since added many names to the list. He also has dispatched letters to each of the Douglas county men who were serving in civilian construction camps at Wake Island when they were captured and interned by the Japanese at Shanghai, China. These letters go through the International Red Cross at Geneva, Switzerland. They received their permission to go to Wake Island from Dr. Edwards while he was serving on the draft board. Several friends are assisting him with contributions toward the postage costs.
