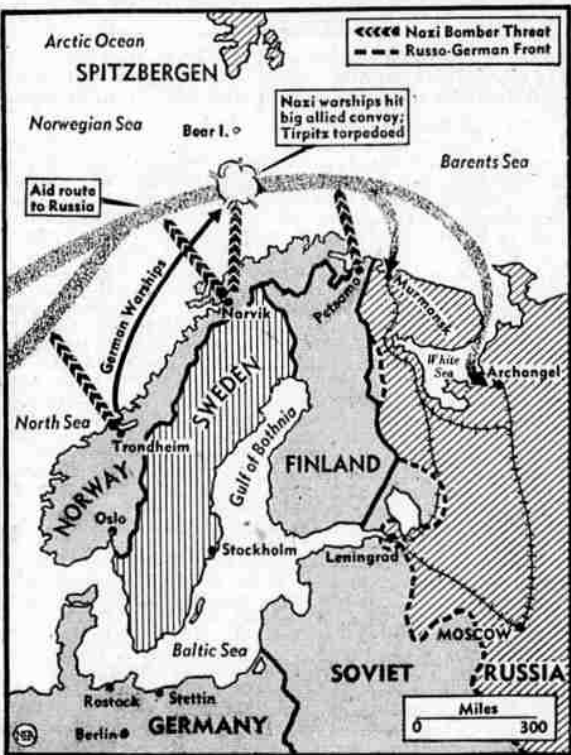

Russians Defend Arctic Supply Line



German attempts to knock out the Arctic supply line to Russia's northern ports are meeting stiff resistance from Soviet forces. Russian bombers are blasting bases in northern Norway and Finland from which Nazis attack convoys, and a Soviet submarine is said to have broken up a German warship raid on an allied convoy by torpedoing the battleship Tirpitz.

Flier Who Bagged 32 Nazis Killed

LONDON, July 18—(AP)—Wing Commander Brendan (Paddy) Finucane, RAF ace credited with destruction of 32 German planes, was killed last Tuesday in a crash off the French coast after a German machine-gun bullet disabled his Spitfire, the air ministry announced tonight.

It was a "million to one chance" shot which ended the career of the 22-year-old ace as he was leading his wing during the largest mass attack yet carried out on German targets in France. The bullet struck the Spitfire's radiator.

The motor was turning too slowly for Finucane to gain height so he opened the sliding hood over the cockpit, took off his helmet and attempted to set his plane down on the sea. The Spitfire "sank like a stone," carrying Finucane to his death.

The No. 2 leader of the wing, Pilot Officer F. A. Alkman, 23, of Toronto, Canada, avenged the death of the Irish ace in his own ground-strafting attack on the German machine-gun post, set up on a spit of land.

"As I went in," Alkman related, "I took a crack at the gun post. When the dust settled down a little there was nothing to be seen on the sand and I guessed my fire blew that post to pieces."

Sprague, State Forester To Visit Douglas Area

SALEM, July 18—(AP)—Western Oregon forests are to be inspected next week by Governor Sprague and N. S. Rogers, state forester, the governor said today.

The two officials plan to spend the first three days of the week in the field, paying special attention to salvage and reforestation programs in the Tillamook burn and projects at the state forestry station at Hamlet in Clatsop county, the federal station at Cascade Head and in the Elliott state forest in Douglas county.

Sugar Price Hoist In 1939 Related

SEATTLE, July 18—(AP)—Richard Kerwood, retail grocer and former wholesale grocery salesman, testified at Nathan Eckstein's federal anti-trust trial yesterday that western Washington wholesale grocers raised their sugar price 25 cents per hundred-weight a week or so after war broke out in September, 1939.

Eckstein is president of Schwabacher Brothers & Co., Inc., and is the only one of 24 defendants on trial, the others having pleaded nolo contendere.

Under cross-examination, Kerwood said sugar prices submitted to retailers the first Monday after the wholesalers' meeting were identical, and when asked how he knew and if he personally had checked the prices quoted by various competitors, Kerwood answered that he had, adding: "These gentlemen's agreements between jobbers didn't always work out."

Asked on redirect examination if the price was advanced on the sugar jobbers already had on hand, Kerwood said it was, and that he knew of nothing the manufacturers could do to affect the price of the sugar already in jobbers' warehouses.

WAACS Not To Escape Penalties

FORT DES MOINES, Ia., July 18—(AP)—Better stay on the straight and narrow, WAACS, even though there is to be no feminine guardhouse here.

Col. Don C. Faith, commandant of the women's army auxiliary corps training school here, today said various punitive methods may be tried in the school. "We may 'campus' them or we may take what the army calls a 'blind,'" he explained. "We will experiment with different approaches to the problem but the calibre of our enrollees is such that we don't think we'll have to do much along that line."

A "campused" WAAC would be denied the privilege of leaving the post during the free time week-ends. A "blind" is the military term for pay-docking.

If an offense is sufficiently serious, the enrollee may be expelled. The first 800 women report for training Monday.

Loss of Two More Allied Cargo Ships Announced

WASHINGTON, July 18—(AP)—The navy announced today the sinking of two more united nations merchant ships, one in the bay of Bengal, off India, and the other in the Atlantic.

A navy announcement said: "Survivors of a medium sized United States merchant ship which was sunk in the bay of Bengal on April 7, 1942, have been landed at a United States port. The ship was bombed by enemy aircraft and shelled by an enemy cruiser.

"A small British merchant vessel was torpedoed and shelled by enemy submarine action in the Atlantic several weeks ago. Survivors have been landed at an east coast port."

Raid Warning Officer to Gather Broadcast Data

Capt. Wm. K. Morgan, ground observation officer for the Portland area of the air raid warning service, is expected to be in Roseburg this evening in company with a representative of the Blue network, according to word received here today. The visit is being made, it is stated, to gather material for a program soon to be presented on a coast-to-coast broadcast devoted to the work of the observation service.

Wealthy Jeweler Kills Sweetheart

SAN LEANDRO, Calif., July 18—(AP)—With two bullets through the temple and another through the chest, the body of 20-year-old Dorena Hammer was found yesterday in the bed of a cabin in an auto court near here.

A few minutes after the discovery, Leslie B. Gireth, wealthy Glendale jeweler, was arrested at a hotel in Fresno.

Beside the bed in which the girl lay dead was a table bearing a vase of red carnations, and a silver-framed photograph, which police identified as that of Gireth. The photograph carried the inscription: "Dorena, my darling; humble words could never express how I love you; how I adore you. Always remember that, your Les." It was dated Sept. 15, 1941.

Detective Sergeant William J. Mortland said Gireth, while being fingerprinted, asserted: "yes, I killed her. I shot her in the head more than once."

Miss Hammer, a meteorological student at Boeing school in Oakland, lived in Glendale and had worked in Gireth's jewelry store off and on the past year.

Gireth's wife recently sued him for divorce, alleging cruel and inhuman treatment.

Two Roseburg Residents Lose Mother by Death

Mrs. Karin Carrie Johnson died Friday at her home in Portland. She was the mother of Ralph Johnson of Bend, Spencer Johnson of Roseburg, Helen Johnson, Portland, and Mrs. Kathryn Karcher, Roseburg. She also leaves two sisters, Signe Ostensen, Wisconsin, and Edith M. Baker, College Place, Wash. Funeral services are to be held at the Holman and Lutz chapel in Portland Monday.
