Constitution No Bar to Clamp On Japs, Court Holds

SEATTLE, July 20.—(AP)—Federal Judge Lloyd Black was expected today to rule soon that curfew and evacuation orders affecting Japanese and Japanese-Americans were constitutional. Judge Black said Saturday he would rule, unless convinced to the contrary, in the case of Gordon Kyoshi Hirabayashi, 24, Japanese-American University of Washington student who contested the orders.

Referring to an argument by Frank L. Waters, attorney for Hirabayashi, that evacuation of persons of Japanese ancestry from critical military areas can be accomplished legally only by amending the constitution, Judge Black observed:

"I do not consider that our constitution makes this nation that helpless to cope with total conflict.

"I recognize that it has been frequently declared by representatives of Japan, Germany and Italy that a constitutional democracy, such as the United States, is completely outmoded by reason of scientific advancement that has so speeded modern war.

"Such representatives have shouted to the world that the constitution of the United States is so restrictive, cumbersome and unyielding as to absolutely bind and imprison the United States, so that this country, self-imprisoned by its own constitution, will be an immobilized victim while the speedy attack of dictator countries, unrestrained by parliament or constitution, destroy it. "But I concede to counsel that I don't believe the constitution of the United States is so unsuited for survival in these days of lightning war that if we need to protect critical military areas we can only do so by the slow process of constitutional amendment."
