We worked, we talked, we plead. Why can't folks see it. We hoped to have a swimming pool. But individuals and organizations can't just buck heads against stone walls. We didn't get the park but did manage to start a playground at the Rose school. Still the swimming pool is a vague dream, while our youngsters swim in the river. Who has ever attended Junior High graduation exercises that is not reminded when the Bashford cup is awarded of our need of a pool. This writer is only one of hundreds who urge that even though we cannot build the pool now that we at least vote that it be done and perhaps it will be evidence enough of our firm stand to prove to our city dads the urgency of such action. We are the only town of this size within miles without a park and swimming pool, a place to go on a warm afternoon or evening, a safe place to play, a haven built by loving or at least civic minded citizens. The time for pussyfooting has past. If authorities do not recognize the need let's show them the false economy. Of what economic value would the lives taken in the Umpqua river have been to Roseburg, or the nation? It seems mid-victorian to let a thing so obviously needed not be voted. The point is that what is everybody's business is nobody's business. Let each of us talk about this as vigorously as we do the war—it is a war too—a war against death; let us see that funds are voted for a pool as soon as labor is available. Let's stop this killing.

This article is probably my swan song—thirty as news men say. I have enjoyed chatting with you for these four years. It is rather frightening to realize that this article is read by so many so far from home. Many fine friends have been made through these lines. If once in awhile I have made you think, that is enough. And again—Let's get that pool!

NEW YORK, July 24.—(AP)—William Ottersbach, 56-year-old German-American bund leader of Seattle, pleaded innocent in federal court yesterday to two indictments alleging conspiracy to violate the selective service act and the alien registration act.

He was held in bail of \$10,000 by Federal Judge Caffey for trial July 28.

Ottersbach, who was the unit leader in Seattle in 1940, was one of 29 persons named in indictments filed in New York federal court several weeks ago.

He was born in Germany and came here about 10 years ago. He was naturalized in 1938. He attended the North Pacific sangherbund, which included representatives from units in Seattle, Portland, Ore., and Seattle.

At his arraignment, Ottersbach said that he was unable to employ counsel and requested the court to assign an attorney to defend him.

## Woman Jailed Here on Drunkenness Charge

Joann Burch, 36, of Klamath Falls was in custody in the county jail here today following her arrest by city police last night on a charge of drunkenness, Chief of Police William Moar reported. The woman was taken to the county jail because the city jail lacks accommodations for women prisoners. She was scheduled for arraignment this afternoon.
