Here's How to Address Mail to War Prisoners

SEATTLE, July 28-(AP) Letters to prisoners of war and civil internees in the far east may be addressed directly to the person, if the name of the prison amp is known, and if not should be sent c-o Japanese Red Cro Tokyo, with a note such as (formerly of Wake Island) under the person's name.

Furthermore, the 13th naval district disclosed today, such a letter should carry the notation "prisoners of war correspondence" in the upper left hand corner, and "via Chicago, Illinois" under the address. The word "free" should be written where

the stamp is unually placed.
Such letters go through a censorship office in Chicago and are then relayed by the universal postal union, Berne, Switzerland, through Istanbul, Tiflis and Sib-


