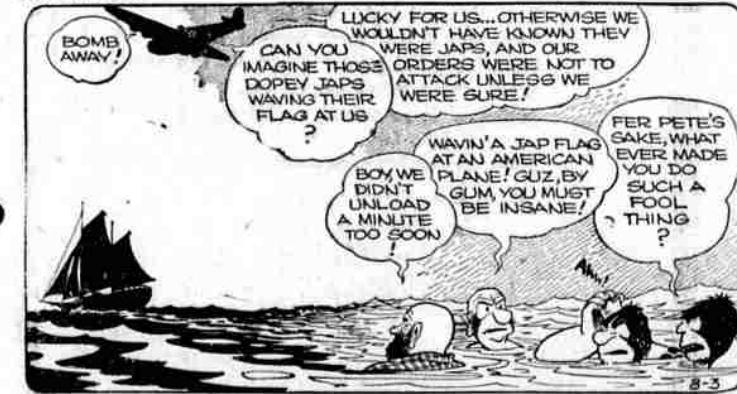

Bahr, Eight Abroad Indicted as Spies

NEWARK, N. J., Aug. 1.—(AP)—A federal grand jury returned yesterday an indictment charging Herbert Karl Friedrich Bahr, 23, formerly of Buffalo, N. Y., and eight men in foreign countries with setting up an international spy ring to gather information on war industries and the armed forces of the United States.

The indictment said the ring had offices in Madrid, Spain; Zurich, Switzerland; Rio de Janeiro, Brazil; Istanbul, Turkey, and Stockholm, Sweden.

The others named in the indictment, which charged them with conspiracy to commit espionage against the United States, were: Karl Bauer, Max Bucholz and Dr. "Otto" Burn, all of Germany; Otto Lindt of Switzerland; Don Julian Rubio of Madrid; Alfredo Mae of Rio de Janeiro; Izante Wennberg of Stockholm and C. J. Saridaki of Istanbul.
