Mrs. Pete Ulam who has been spending the past two weeks at Stevenson, Washington with Mr. Ulam returned to her home here Monday. She was accompanied

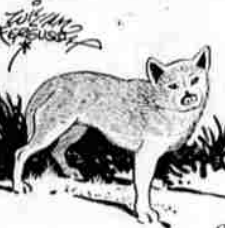

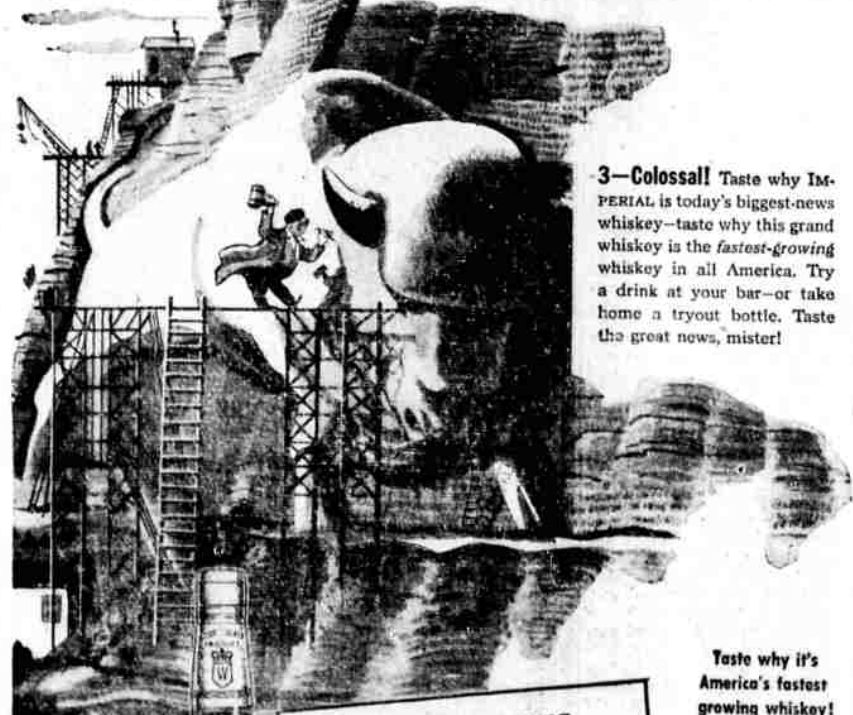
