Red Cross Canteen Unit Planning Feed For Service Men

The Red Cross Canteen unit of the Civilian Defense organization has assumed the arrangement for feeding a large group of service men expected to be in Roseburg Friday for participation in the Douglas County Victory day program. It was announced today by Mrs. Roy Bellows, county chairman.

It is anticipated that 35 or more enlisted men will be here from Camp White, Medford, while a group of navy men is expected from Portland. It also is possible that other groups from various branches of the service will participate.

The canteen unit, Mrs. Bellows states, will serve luncheon and dinner for the visiting service men at the Episcopal Parish hall. Dinner arrangements are in charge of Velle Broadway, city chairman, and Mrs. Harry Single. Luncheon arrangements are being made by Mrs. R. L. Whipple, Mrs. Harry Black, and Mrs. J. L. Pounds.

The members of the unit recently received uniforms and will appear as a uniformed group for the first time Friday.

The meals, it was stated, are exclusively for visiting service men and are not open to the general public.

Last Gun Battle Of Harry Tracy, Outlaw, Recalled

Suicide of Wounded Oregon Fugitive Followed Combat Forty Years Ago Today

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Just 40 years ago today, there was an air of excitement running rampant through the little community of Creston in Lincoln county, Washington.

A five-man posse led by Maurice Smith, Creston attorney, and E. C. Lanter, a physician, was rumored to have left town in search of Harry Tracy, the notorious outlaw whose gun already carried seven notches as a result of brushes with officers and ranchers in outlying communities.

(Sixty days previous, the kill-er had escaped with Frank Merrill from the Oregon penitentiary in what was described by prison officials as "the most memorable break of the decade," killing two guards. Less than 30 days before, Merrill's body was found face down in a strawberry field near Olympia. "Tracy had shot him.") Besides Smith and Lanter, the posse comprised J. J. Morrison, a section foreman; Frank Lillgren, a warehouseman, and C. A. Straub, a liveryman and constable. All but Smith and Lanter are dead.

Smith, later of Spokane, is now chief examiner for the Washington state liquor control board in Olympia. Lanter is a physician in Seattle.

Ranchhand Furnishes Tip.

According to Smith, word of Tracy's presence at the nearby Eddy ranch was obtained from a ranchhand, Goldfinch, who, three days earlier, had been forced to lead Tracy to the home where he might rest himself and his horses.

Tracy and Lanter borrowed guns, and set out for the Eddy ranch. Unseen they reached cover near the barn just as one of the Eddy brothers and Tracy came out of the barn.

"Take a poke at him, Smith," Lanter said to his partner, who had the better gun.

Although the outlaw was easily recognizable and there was no danger of mistaken identity, Smith hesitated to shoot him down in cold blood. Instead, he called to Tracy to throw up his hands and surrender. Tracy stepped behind Eddy and a horse. Using both for cover, he walked left to the barn where he had left his 30-30 Winchester rifle—now one of Smith's most prized possessions.

The two posse members separated, each guarding an end to the barn. Tracy burst from the end Lanter was guarding and the doctor started firing.

Smith ran past his partner, and took a position high on the rimrock, where he had a view of the entire draw.

Sun Handicaps Outlaw.

Holing up behind a large balsam poplar, Tracy returned their fire—his aim distorted because he had jammed his gunsight on a rock and because he was firing toward the sinking sun.

Soon the outlaw calmly walked off through a clump of fruit trees into a field of barley where he attempted to crawl down the draw. A wide watercourse running through the gully had, in spots, drowned out the grain. Whenever Tracy reached one of these spots, Smith, could see him and opened fire.

Soon, Tracy began to fight back, lying on his back, shooting over his knee.

While in that position, Smith shot him squarely in the shin, midway between the ankle and knee. The bullet broke both bones of the lower leg, passing

through and re-entering the leg at the thigh.

The exchange emptied Smith's gun, and while he was reloading Tracy crawled back into the high barley and was not seen alive again.

The posse later learned he had attempted to stop the flow of blood by twisting a small strap around the calf of the broken leg—without success.

Suicide Ends Career.

As darkness fell, the men heard a muffled shot from the field, but thinking it might be another of Tracy's famous tricks—which, legend says, included sprinkling red pepper in his tracks to thwart the bloodhounds used by his trackers—they suspended the search until morning, content to guard the draw and prevent his escape.

At daybreak the bandit's body was soon found. He had shot himself in the head.

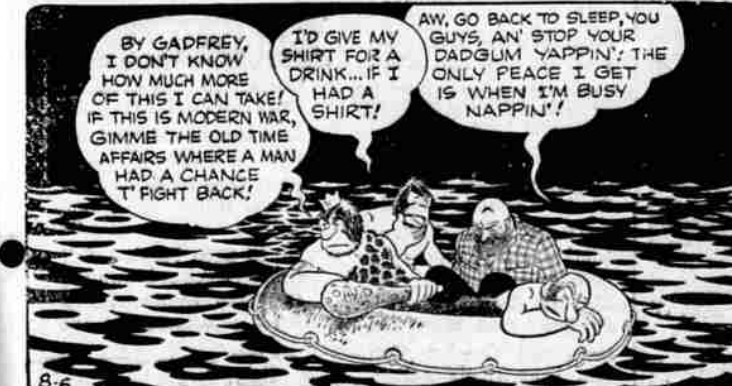
