Supplies for War Prisoners Await O. K. of Japan

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.—A 69-car shipment of food, clothing, drugs and tobacco from the Canadian Red Cross has arrived for loading aboard a mercy ship, which will carry supplies to allied war prisoners in the western Pacific if the Japanese grant safe passage.

Meanwhile the San Francisco press club announced that \$12,450 had been received from Salinas, home of a tank company which fought at Bataan, for its special relief fund. This amount came from auctioning a single carload of Salinas lettuce in Chicago. Eleven more such carloads are en route east.

St. Paul was thoroughly acquainted with grief and suffering. Five times he was beaten of the Jews, forty stripes, save one. Thrice was he beaten with rods. He was often in prison. Once he was stoned and left for dead. He had more than his share of shipwrecks. He ran the whole gamut of perils. In weariness, watchings, pain, in hunger, in thirst and fastings, in cold and nakedness this maker of history worked. Yet he tells people not to sorrow. Why was he able to do that? Because down deep in his heart he had religion; and religion had him. He saw that all of life is tied in the same bundle and that grief and suffering comes to all, but with very different effect. It will make some bitter, some better. If you have religion in your heart you have God. You sorrow in one way; if you have no religion in your heart you have no God. You sorrow in another way. So Paul, when he wrote to his absent friends, those who were sadly distressed, disheartened, you must not sorrow like those who have no hope. His pen puts it negatively. But Paul in his life put it positively: You must sorrow like those who have God. Robert Louis Stevenson wrote, make the most of the best and the least of the worst. In other words magnify your blessings, and minimize your sorrows. I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me. Amen.

All-Plywood Trainer Glider Passes Test

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 6.—(AP)—An all-plywood plastic trainer glider, designed for a speed of 112 miles an hour, has been put through successful flights.

Norman Larsen, general manager of Bowlius Sailplanes, Inc., in announcing the tests with

army approval, said the glider, made of non-strategic materials is non-magnetic and would be almost impossible for enemy listening devices to detect in flight.
