SALEM, Aug. 6.—(AP)—State Superintendent of Public Instruction Rex Putnam appealed yesterday to all former teachers to come back to their jobs to alleviate a severe shortage of teachers in Oregon schools.

Putnam said many teachers, because of the small salaries paid them, have gone into defense industries or to teach in other states.
