Douglas Schools Call for Teachers

A critical situation exists in Douglas county schools, particularly with relation to the securing of teachers for the forthcoming term. Mrs. Lulu C. Gorrill, county school superintendent, reports today. Restrictions have been eased on teacher requirements and many persons who have had former teaching experience, she states, are needed during the coming year. Some have previously made application, she reports, but were rejected because of standards which are relieved by a new order from the state superintendent of public instruction. Persons who hold or have held one-year or five-year certificates to teach in Oregon, based on graduation from a standard normal school, teachers college, college or university, now are eligible for recertification. Mrs. Gorrill reports. She has application blanks on hand and requests that persons desiring to make application contact her at once. All schools that will need teachers for the fall term also are asked to notify the county superintendent.

News of Men From Douglas County In War Service

Friends of Bruce Carter who were thrilled by news received yesterday of his excellent work in officer-candidate school at the Quantico marine base will doubtless share his great disappointment over the fact that he has been scheduled for medical discharge. A knee, injured during his high school days, when he fell forcibly against a concrete curb on the athletic field track, failed to withstand the strenuous activity of the marine "boot" camp, despite the fact that Carter had spent considerable time and money for treatment of the knee immediately prior to entering service. A message received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. (Doc) Carter, stated that he had been subjected to examination and treatment at the Quantico marine hospital and that he had been scheduled for discharge because of physical disability. Unless a change is made in the order and he is able to secure transfer to limited duty, he probably will return home in the near future.

Word has been received here regarding advancement in grade of the Balf twins, Harry A. and Harold P. Balf, sons of the late Mr. and Mrs. Peter Balf of this city. Harry has been promoted from major to lieutenant colonel and now is stationed at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. Harold is a major and is serving with the U. S. armed forces in Australia. The brothers were graduated from Roseburg high school and later from Oregon State college. Both worked in San Francisco prior to their entrance in the war which marked their first separation.

Aviation Cadet Ralph Garhart, son of Mrs. Elizabeth Garhart, is home on furlough. He enlisted last January in the army air corps and completed his course in aviation mechanics at Chanute field, Ill., graduating June 23. He has received his appointment as aviation cadet in the army flying forces and was enrolled at Kelly field, Texas, for officers flight training. He reported to the field July 10, but became ill and underwent an emergency operation for appendicitis. He was granted leave during convalescence and will leave soon to start flight training preparatory to a commission.

Cigarette Flipper Eyed by Police as Fire Originator

SALEM, Aug. 6.—(Special)—Charles P. Pray, state superintendent of police, has on hand statistics of interest to the Oregon motorists who may want to know just why enforcement of the cigarette flipper during the current season.

"The Oregon police were always mindful of the need for enforcing the forest code which restricts the throwing away of burning materials," Superintendent Pray declared, "but it took statistics to drive home the dire need for the fire prevention measure and the importance of its enforcement."

The statistics which has so impressed the state No. 1 enforcement officer gave convincing proof that the cigarette, thrown carelessly aside, is a major cause of roadside fire which may spread to farm, field and forest.

Here are the facts—Bureau of Standards studies show that cigarettes are consumed to an average length of one and one quarter inches. They then burn eight and one half to twelve minutes, and six out of nine burn full length. When tossed on dried grass pad, 85.3 per cent of the cigarettes ignited the grass. On Douglas fir duff in the forests of western Washington, 20 tests set 19 fires. On rotted Douglas fir wood, 10 tests set five fires, although the relative humidity

was above the critical point.

Small wonder then that the state police have increased their vigilance in enforcing the fire laws. Advice to motorists is to cooperate by putting the ash trays of their cars to maximum use, and Superintendent Pray has this suggestion to offer as a reminder, "Chaperone that cigarette, don't let it go alone."

Jap Evacuation Centers Opened in Idaho, Wyoming

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Additional Japanese relocation centers near Eden, Idaho, and Cody, Wyoming, have been opened and will receive their first detachments of evacuees from the Pacific coast within a week, the army said.

Plans announced by Col. Karl R. Bendtsen, assistant chief of

staff in charge of civil affairs for the western defense command, are for 7,200 Japanese now stationed at the Puyallup assembly center in western Washington to be moved to the Idaho camp and for 5,300 at the Los Angeles county fairgrounds in Pomona to be taken to the Wyoming center.

Construction of the two newly opened resettlement camps began only a few weeks ago. That in Idaho, known as the Minidoka relocation center, is about 15 miles east of Twin Falls and 150 miles southeast of Boise. Covering 68,000 acres of public lands, it will, in time, quarter 10,000 evacuees. Sugar beets, potatoes, beans,

onions and hay are grown in the area.

The Wyoming camp, situated on the Shoshone river 13 miles northwest of Cody, has been designated the Heart mountain center and also eventually will provide accommodations for 10,000 persons.

Its 27,800 acres can be irrigated and the land adapted to production of sugar beets, grain, beans, potatoes and seed peas. For the present, however, the bulk of work opportunities open to the evacuees will be limited to leveling and clearing ground, graveling roads and completing the irrigation system.

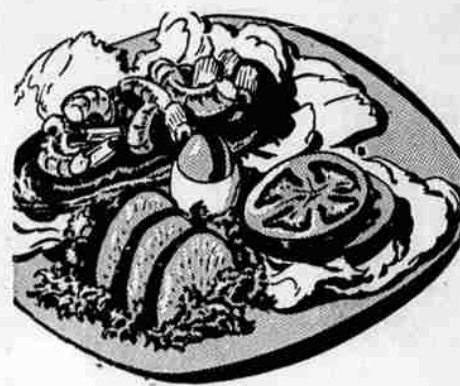
