vote all his time to selling war bonds without salary or commission. He feels it's a privilege.

He has sold more than \$300,000 worth of bonds and has a \$500,000 goal set for October 1. He buys bonds with his own funds and resells them to a regular list of "customers" whose purchases total more than \$21,000 weekly. Gluck himself has pledged to put \$5,000 annually into war bonds.

"I arrange their purchases so that all they have to do is to make out a check," Gluck explained. "The bonds are bought for them in advance and delivered to their offices or front doors—they never have any excuse for putting it off."

Rainfall in July Below Normal

July weather produced 14 cloudless days, 13 partly cloudy and four cloudy, according to the monthly meteorological summary compiled by J. C. McCallister, chief of the U. S. weather bureau station here. Measurable rainfall was recorded on only two days during the month.

Total rainfall was .16 of an inch or one-half the July normal of .32 of an inch. The July deficiency brought the shortage in rainfall since Jan. 1942, to 4.27 inches, although for the period since Sept. 1, 1941, there still remained an excess of .94 of an inch.

Temperatures during the month showed 3.3 degrees above the daily average, with the highest reading being 106 degrees on the date of July 1, and the lowest 50 degrees, the night of July 12.
