Flying Boats Not Adapted to War, Builder Declares

SEATTLE, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Advocates of air fleets to take the place of surface cargo carriers to escape the submarine menace are "on the right track" but flying boats are the wrong type of planes, a Seattle aviation executive believes.

Oliver West, executive vice-president in charge of manufacturing at the Boeing Aircraft company plant, told newsmen yesterday that "flying boats are passing out of the picture."

"They'll always be needed to reach places where no landing fields are accessible," he declared. "But for transoceanic and cross-continent flights, the faster, lighter land plane is the only thing."

"Flying boats are too slow. They call them clay pigeons in the Aleutians."

West's company produces the famed flying fortresses, four motored bombers used by allied air forces throughout the world with great effectiveness.

The aviation executive's remarks were made at a press conference in connection with the award of the joint army-navy production award to the Boeing company.

Production of Boeing flying fortresses, already swelled tremendously since Pearl harbor, could be increased two-thirds if necessary materials were available, Boeing Aircraft's president, Philip G. Johnson believes.

"We underestimated our capacity," Johnson said. "Studies are now being made to determine if these additional materials can be obtained."

Improved production methods have cut the number of man-hours of labor on each plane by nearly two-thirds, Johnson declared. Part of the gain is due to subcontracting and part to simplification of manufacturing processes, he said.

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Sports fishermen, who annually troll by the hundreds in the waters at the mouth of the Columbia river after close of the commercial season Aug. 25, will be under strict regulation this year.

Commercial fishing boats may not carry passengers, under regulations issued by Port Capt. M. P. Jensen of the coast guard, and owners of small boats must have coast guard identification cards.

If sports anglers want to try the waters from commercial boats, they must sign on as regular crew members and possess the proper identification papers issued by the coast guard.

Boat owners may take friends on fishing trips and only the owner needs credentials. He will be held responsible for his guests. The same is true of rentals—the owner is responsible for the fishermen to whom he rents. But ferries and regular passenger lines are the only commercial craft permitted to carry passengers in the defense area or to sea.

Two areas at the river's mouth are closed to fishing.

Rogue Valley Bartlett's Rise to \$75 Per Ton

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 11.—(AP)—The price for No. 1 Bartlett pears rose to \$75 a ton here last week, and packers predicted it would remain the basic price for the Rogue river valley crop.

They said that culls, to be diced for salad, cocktails and similar uses, will probably sell at \$62.50 a ton.

Amendment to Tax Bill Loses

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The senate finance committee rejected today a proposed amendment to the new revenue bill which would have required the payment of taxes by the recipient on all earned income in the eight community property states.

The action came on a vote of 11 to 4.

"Then that means the community property states can rest at ease for at least another year?" a newsman asked chairman George (D-Ga.).

"That means they can rest at ease," responded George.

He estimated that inclusion of the provision would have added approximately \$85,000,000 in new revenue, based upon the income tax rates set by the house.

Committee members said that the proposal would have had the effect of preventing a man from dividing his earned income with his wife for tax purposes, thus avoiding the increased rate of a higher bracket.

Eight states have community tax laws—Texas, California, Louisiana, Arizona, New Mexico, Nevada, Idaho, and Washington.

Oregon's Hop Crop To Show Reduction

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Oregon and California hop growers expect a larger harvest than was indicated six weeks ago, the department of agriculture reported yesterday.

Oregon's crop is expected to be 13,320,000 pounds, which is lower than last year's 16,800,000 pounds, but more than predicted in a July 1 survey.

The west coast is expected to produce 39,154,000 pounds on the basis of Aug. 1 conditions.

The indicated yields: Washington 13,984,000 pounds compared to 13,320,000 in 1941; California 11,310,000 compared to 10,260,000 in 1941.

PORTLAND, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The U. S. employment service said today that the fall hop harvest will be in full swing by Aug. 21, with picking prices varying from \$2.50 to \$3 a hundred pounds.

The top price is offered in the

Grants Pass area. Most Willamette valley yards are offering \$2.50.

Growers predicted that the price for cured hops would average 36 cents a pound, compared to last year's 27 cents.

Oakland Man Has Costly Experience in Eugene

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 11.—Delmar Rice, resident of Oakland, Oregon, now staying at the Smeed hotel, went into Lone Star Joe's early Friday evening where he met a man called "CES." They had a few drinks together.

Several hours later, Rice regained consciousness. He was in his own car parked at Springfield Junction. He had a lump on his head, his car keys were gone, and so was his wallet containing \$50.

"CES" is described as being five feet 10 inches tall, about 160 pounds, of medium complexion, light brown hair, straight hair "combed slick back."

Rice is now looking for "CES." So are the city police.

Log-Lumber Industry Names Special Agent

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—(AP)—George Herington of Portland, Ore., was named today special representative of the Pacific coast log and lumber industry to work in cooperation with Frederick H. Brundage, recently named by WPB as Pacific coast log and lumber administrator.

Herington's selection was announced by Wendell Lund, director of the WPB labor production division, who said Herington also would work with the management-labor industry board for the west coast, and with AFL and CIO unions in the industry, on problems of effective use of labor, production in high labor turnover, and increased efficiency in production.

Blackout Rules Issued by Oregon Defense Council

SALEM, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The state civilian defense council has issued the following questions and answers to explain the dim-out that will begin August 20 in 14 Oregon counties.

Answers for the householder:

Q. Will there be nightly blackouts?

A. No, but signs and bright exterior illumination must be extinguished.

Q. Do I have to pull down my shades each night?

A. Only if you have windows visible from the sea.

Q. Are lighted driveways permitted?

A. Yes, but no light may be emitted upward from them.

Q. On windows visible from the sea, are venetian blinds permitted?

A. Yes, if they are kept tightly closed at night.

Q. Must the light at our garage door be extinguished?

A. No, but it must be shielded so that no light goes upward. Don't use a lamp larger than 50 watts.

Q. Do our garden floodlights have to be extinguished?

A. Yes, if the intensity is more than one foot candle. Ask a lighting expert to measure it for you.

Q. Should I let my porch light burn?

A. It's all right if the lamp is not too bright and if it is shielded. But don't leave it on when you are away from home, because there might be a blackout.

Q. Can we use the garbage incinerator at night?

A. No, use it in the morning.

Q. Can we use our barbecue pit at night?

A. The glow of embers is not objectionable, but flames are unless shielded.

Q. Can we use the lights which illuminate our sidewalk?

A. Yes, if they are shielded.

Q. Are flashlights restricted?

A. They are prohibited in areas visible from the sea. In other dim-out areas, they should always be pointed downward and should not be too bright.

Q. How about the grocer across the street who keeps his electric sign burning. Should I report him?

A. Your air raid warden will take care of him. There are stiff penalties for non-compliance with dim-out regulations.

Answers for the Motorist

Q. In areas visible from the sea, a maximum of 250 beam candlepower for vehicular headlights is permitted. What is the power of the average automobile's headlights?

A. From 20,000 to 30,000 beam candlepower for both lamps.

Q. How will I know when my lights are all right?

A. Have them tested at a headlight adjusting station.

Q. Is it safe to drive with parking lights?

A. Yes, if you are completely alert.

Q. Are rear lights restricted?

A. No. The regulations don't

restrict tail lights, stop lights and license plate lights.

Q. How will I know when I'm driving in a zone where headlights are restricted?

A. Those areas will be posted.

Q. Is it safe for pedestrians to cross streets in dim-out zones after dark?

A. Yes, but they must be careful and alert, remembering that the driver can't see very well. Pedestrians should wear some white clothing.

Q. What will be done about traffic lights?

A. They will be shielded.
