NEW YORK—Coffee clothes for the coffee countries—gay raincoat for playdays and play-evenings of a Latin American vacation—are spotlighted in a fashionable New York event, the Coffee Ball for the benefit of Manhattan's Goddard Neighborhood Center.

Thirteen topflight North American designers made the clothes. The lucky wearers should appear what the Latins call simpatico, or close kin to the proverbial French chic. The collection is also intended for North American, early-spring town and resort life. Doubtless it will influence the average woman's next-summer clothes. But it is designed primarily for the North American who will be flying or steaming down to Good Neighbor country for a vacation.

Travel people report that despite "unfavorable conditions" reservations for January and February indicate much heavier pleasure travel this year to the southern countries, especially to resorts

where Spanish culture and Latin aristocracy, with its European traditions and prestige, already have established the active sports and sophisticated diversions that smart North Americans look for on their holidays.

Now here are clothes introducing six new colors inspired by the big South and Central American product, coffee. The colors are cafe tinto, which is black; cafe con leche, and that is beige or literally "coffee with milk"; coffee blossom which is white; green coffee bean brown; and coffee berry red.

Echoes of elegant Latin American life are in the design, the mood of the clothes, too. For instance, Muriel King's coffee blossom chiffon dancing dress—lace-ruffled, as warmly reticent-looking as the still-chaperoned senorita. Just the gown for dancing at the Hotel del Prado in Barranquilla, Columbia, a full-blown society resort; or for the private ballroom of an hacienda in Cali, if you're lucky enough to have friends there.

Daytime clothes for luncheon, spectator sports and cocktails are made of prints and linens, good clothes for the cool mountain resorts of Brazil. There are soft wools and plaids for cool days at Chile's and Bolivia's and Argentina's really elevated excitement-spots, with their golf, tennis, pool swimming and, by July, skiing.

Clarepotter does a dinner suit which looks quite made for sophisticated Vina del Mar, up-and-coming American Riviera near Santiago, Chile, where the mountains come right down to the sea. All the evening clothes of the collection are calculated excitement clothes. They have slit skirts, plunging necklines, full-length capes, and head pieces attached to dresses.

Beachwear vies in splendor with the spectacular beaches of Vina del Mar. One outstanding characteristic of these smooth, splash-colored swim and sun costumes: they're ensemble, the suit having its own tailored long-sleeved jacket or a cape against the breeze from the mountains just over yonder.
