OUR GREEN WAY OF LIFE

What do the forestry terms, "timber cropping" and "tree farming," mean in practice by the West Coast lumber industry? Here is an answer in pictures. Upper left is a block of seed-bearing Douglas fir left in logging seven years ago, to provide natural regeneration on a harvested area. An average of 1,000 young trees per acre make a thriving new crop. Upper right shows one of the 7 1/2 million reforested acres in the Douglas fir region.

Protection of the slow-growing timber crop by industry costs money. Six tank-pumper cars operated by one lumber company for fire-fighting are illustrated. Their combined capacity is 60,000 gallons. Such equipment is common on logging operations.

In addition to 11 million acres of old growth in the Douglas fir region there are more than 3 million acres of second growth of saw timber size. Posts and poles are a first harvest. Pictured are 40-foot poles selectively taken from a 60-year-old stand of Douglas fir. Such cropping helps pay tree-farming costs and gives more growing room for remaining trees.

The Rev. William U. Fugate, 84, a retired minister of the South Methodist church, died late Monday at Mercy hospital following a long period of illness.

Born July 17, 1858, in Scott county, Virginia, Mr. Fugate served as an early-day circuit rider for the Methodist church, South. Since his retirement from active ministry he has made his home with his daughter, Mrs. R. O. Chaney, in Myrtle Creek.

His wife died in 1897. Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Chaney and Mrs. Wendell Pariss, the latter of Berkeley, Calif., and a son, William G. Fugate, who is serving with the U. S. navy in the Pacific area.

He also leaves two brothers and a sister. Funeral services will be held at 10:30 Thursday in the Methodist church at Myrtle Creek, the Rev. Mr. Chaney officiating. Interment will follow in the Myrtle Creek cemetery. The arrangements are in charge of the Roseburg Undertaking company.

Girls at Boeing Plant Cause Ban On Frivolity

SEATTLE, Aug. 18.—(AP)—It's too bad, but the girls aren't working out any too well in the vast plant where the army's crack bombers, the flying fortresses, are made.

H. Oliver West, executive vice-president and guiding genius of production at the Boeing Aircraft company, said today that although some women were doing fine work, a great many "are here for other than serious purposes."

They pursue social life in the factory workrooms, it appears; they will not wear proper clothing, as suggested by the personnel office; and they do not confine their permanent waves in nets, nor even snoods, although they've been told time and again that long flowing bobs are apt to get caught, painfully, in machinery. They are in fact, said West, "youngsters in search of a good time."

Nevertheless, West concedes that it is absolutely essential to utilize women-power to keep the production of the famous Boeing flying fortresses up to par. As of this month, 26 per cent of all employees at Boeing are women, and the percentage probably will increase, he said.

Segregation Planned The solution, as outlined by West at an interview with newspaper correspondents taking part in the National Association of Manufacturers' tour of war

plants, is gradually to segregate the women.

"We intend to put most of them into sub-assembly work," West explained, "separating them from the men in shops on the second floor balcony." The reporters had just returned from viewing the balcony, along with the rest of Boeing's busy, noisy plant.

Sub-assembly was suited to women workers, West continued, because generally it called for less skilled and less arduous work and afforded fewer opportunities for flirtation on company time.

During the conference, four young women were ushered in from their work benches to offer good-natured rebuttal to "the boss."

"I didn't mean these girls, of course," West assured. "They're just what we need."

They were an exceptionist, an ex-elevator operator, an ex-ice cream factory worker and an ex-teacher.

The former teacher, Mrs. Margie Watson, holder of an M. A. degree in mathematics, said:

"They're trying to make an engineer out of me, and I hope they do. But after the war, when my husband comes home—he's a doctor in the army—I'm going to quit work and keep house."

Cowboys Answer Service Call of U. S. Coast Guard

CLOVIS, N. M., Aug. 18.—(AP)—If, before long, the seagoing cowboy jingles his spurs and six-gun into this man's navy, don't be surprised.

Cow waddies of the eastern New Mexico plains have scented a way to mix saddles and salt water, and scored are looking for methods of joining up with the U. S. coast guard as guardians of the nation's shores.

The last time New Mexico's cowhand fraternity mixed en masse in a spot of trouble, Teddy Roosevelt's rough riders were born.

This time, sun-tanned riders of range and rodeo ring are on the loose in answer to the call of the coast guard for trained riders to patrol the beaches against invasion.

The coast guard recently announced plans to start recruiting a mounted beach patrol in the near future under the coast guard command of the eighth naval district, New Orleans.

Since word leaked out, riders from the Texas Panhandle and eastern New Mexico have ridden into town for information. Many of them already belong to mounted patrols organized for local emergency duty, and some are stars of rodeo arenas from coast to coast.

According to the coast guard, requirements for the seagoing waddies will be less rigid than for regular service, but they will receive regular pay for full time duty. Their military status remains to be determined.

It may take time to acquaint the navy with the fore and aft intricacies of a cinch, but it's certain that any waddie beach patrol will know how to bulldog a Jap quicker than you can say "let 'er buck."
