Frank Steinhauer, 76, resident of Happy valley, died at his home early today following a long period of ill health. Born in Bureau county, Ill., Nov. 27, 1865, he came to Douglas county in 1902 and located in Happy valley. He was married Dec. 11, 1913, to Jessie Telford, who died Jan. 24, 1936.

Surviving are two sons, Russell Steinhauer, Happy valley, and Kirby Steinhauer, who is now with the army air forces at the Portland air base.

Mr. Steinhauer was a member of the Methodist church.

Funeral services will be conducted by the Rev. C. A. Edwards at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel at 10:30 a. m. Saturday and will be concluded at Civil Bend cemetery.

Dr. O. R. Hess Loses
His Father by Death

Dr. Orrin A. Hess, 66, father of Dr. O. R. Hess of Roseburg, now serving as a captain in the army medical corps at Fort Lewis, Wash., died in Portland Tuesday. The elder Dr. Hess, a native of Ohio, had been a resident of Portland for the last 32 years and had served for 23 years as Multnomah county physician immediately prior to his retirement 18 months ago.

He was active in Masonic work and prominent in medical circles of the state.

Surviving are the widow, who resides in Portland; Captain Hess, Roseburg, now stationed at Fort Lewis, and a daughter, Dorothy Marquis, Tacoma.

YOUR WEEKLY RECIPE

VICTORY SALAD DESSERT

1 package lemon gelatin 1/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups boiling water 1 cup sliced peaches
2 tablespoons lemon juice 1/4 cup raisins
1/2 cup broken nut meats
Dissolve gelatin in water. Cool until quite thick and syrupy. Beat until frothy and thick. Lightly fold in rest of ingredients. Chill until thick. Stir well and pour in the thickness of about one inch. Chill until firm. Cut in squares and serve atop lettuce or salad. Mayonnaise or salad dressing may be added.

Homemakers' Guide SAFEWAY



Things you may not
know and should
... about tomatoes

Tomatoes are without question the most versatile of all foods. They have a place at every meal—tomato juice, soup, salad, sandwiches, sauces, relishes—and they are equally good cooked or uncooked.

Tomato connoisseurs say the best way to enjoy them is to first scald them, then chill, peel, slice, and salt them. But there many other ways, too.

Tomatoes are wonderful for adding sparkle to other foods—meats, macaroni and spaghetti dishes, and vegetable casseroles. You'll find that round steak, pork or veal chops and steaks, shoulder lamb chops, and similar cuts of meat are more tender and flavorful when braised in tomato juice or tomato soup instead of water.

This is the season when tomatoes are ripe and juicy in most parts of the country, and it's a good time to put up tomato juice. The juice is almost as versatile as tomatoes themselves. Serve it hot or cold, as is or highly seasoned, or combined with other liquids. For peppy flavor, add lemon juice and Worcestershire sauce.

TOMATO JUICE

10 lbs. tomatoes 2 tps. salt
Wash and core but do not peel tomatoes. Cut in eighths. Place in large 8-qt. kettle; add 2 cups water; cover; boil 10 minutes. Put through sieve to remove seeds. Add salt and heat to boiling. Pour into hot sterilized jars or bottles; seal, and pasteurize (directions follow). Makes about 7 pts. juice.

Bottling and Pasteurization
Do not use lids with zinc tops. Wash jars thoroughly; sterilize by placing in boiling water for 10 minutes. Heat juice to 175° F. to 180° F. Pour into hot jars, filling just to 1 1/2 inches from the top to allow room for expansion. Seal at once, according to type of lid. Place hot jars in water which has been heated to 160° F. to 185° F. Stand jars upright on rack; have completely covered with water. Heat water to 175° F. to 185° F. and hold temperature 30 minutes. Do not heat higher than 185° F. Remove immediately from hot water. Test seals for tightness. Let cool undisturbed in place free from draft. When cold, wipe off and store.
