

Pittsburgh Hands Cincinnati Sixth Straight Defeat

The Pittsburgh Pirates of the National League, gunning for Cincinnati's first division place, handed the Reds their sixth straight defeat in a row yesterday and beat Derringer in the bargain, 9-2. The drubbing left the Reds 5 1/2 games behind the third-place New York Yankees, who were idle.

The Detroit Tigers posted the third straight loss on the Cleveland Indians, 6-1.

Elsewhere in the American league, the Philadelphia Athletics shut out the Washington Senators, 8-0, and the Boston Red Sox divided a doubleheader with the New York Yankees, continuing a stretch duel that would be more interesting if the Yanks were not 11 1/2 games ahead.

A pair of homers by Tabor and another by Williams accounted for all Boston's runs and a 6-4 triumph in first game as Hughson limited the Yankees to seven hits for his 16th pitching victory and his tenth in a row.

Keller, who hit his 20th home run in the opener, smashed No. 21 with the score tied in the ninth inning of the nightcap to break up a pitching duel between Bonham and Dobson and give New York a 2-1 decision.

In the National League pennant chase, the Brooklyn Dodgers crushed the Boston Braves, 11-1, but the St. Louis Cardinals stayed 6 1/2 games behind by wallowing the Chicago Cubs, 5-1.

Donnelly Leads League Hurlers by Big Margin

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Sacramento's Blix Donnelly has a husky lead on the rest of the regular Pacific Coast league twirlers—those with 15 games or more to their credit.

Donnelly, including contests through Tuesday, boasts a 720

average, with 18 victories against seven defeats. His nearest competitors are Seattle's twirling twins, Hal Turpin and Dick Barrett, with 148 strikeouts, leads that department.

Hard-luck lad of the circuit is veteran Ad Liska of Portland's last place Beavers, who ranks third in strikeouts with 126, but is far down the won-and-lost list with 11 triumphs against 18 setbacks.

In War Service.

Two Roseburg boys, Roger Olmscheid and Bob Bellows, former classmates in Roseburg high school, are hurling friendly army-type insults at one another across 100 miles of barren space in the Aleutian Islands. According to a letter received by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Olmscheid from their son, who is stationed with the navy air patrol in the Aleutian area, he recently learned of the presence there of Lieutenant Bob Bellows, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Bellows. Although the two Roseburg men are only 100 miles apart, they

have not been able to get together, but fliers between the two bases are carrying messages, which, considering the fact that the classmates are in rival branches of service, may well be imagined as being far from complimentary. Olmscheid, who enlisted in the navy in June, 1941, is a radio operator on a navy patrol bomber. He served in the Pacific area, based at San Diego, but was moved to Alaska the day after the Japanese invasion of the Aleutians. He reports that he is seeing plenty of action and has participated in numerous bombing raids.

George Spaur, former Roseburg resident, has been promoted from major to lieutenant colonel at Fort Lewis, Washington, where he is serving as assistant engineer in the ninth army corps. Colonel Spaur, who was a lieutenant in the army reserve prior to the World war, was engaged in the automotive service business here prior to 1939, when he went to Salem with the state department of forestry. Stenographers Exam To Be Held in Roseburg

An intensive recruiting campaign for stenographers and typists for immediate appointment in Washington, D. C., will be conducted in Roseburg Friday and Saturday, August 21 and 22, by Miss Helen Busenbark, special representative from the 11th district of the United States civil service commission.

The starting salary is \$1440 a year and anyone who will be eighteen years of age by October first is eligible to apply. Required speeds have been reduced to 35 words a minute for typists and 96 words of dictation for stenographers. Persons desiring more complete information are invited to inquire at the Roseburg post office Friday or Saturday.

Umpqua Forest Fires So Far Of Small Extent

Only one class B fire has occurred so far on the Umpqua National forest, despite the fact that electric storms during the last week set more than a dozen fires, of which either two or three were in the North Umpqua district, four in Diamond lake district, and at least seven in the South Umpqua district, V. V. Harpham, forest supervisor, reported today.

The forest service, Harpham states, classifies fires by the letters of the alphabet, Class A fires being of less than one-fourth acre while class B fires are of less than 10 acres. With but one exception, all fires so far this season are in Class A, or less than one-fourth acre, except the Class B fire, which was caused when a ranch house owned by Earl C. Cowles, located on Coffey creek, about five miles northwest of Tiller, was burned. Fire spread from the burning building covered approximately six acres.

An outstanding example of cooperation on the part of private interests with the forest service was in connection with a lightning fire within the area now being logged on the South Umpqua watershed by the Southern Oregon Sugar Pine company under the management of Elton Jackson, the forest supervisor reports. This fire was set by lightning near the logging operation and

the prompt action by Mr. Jackson's crew soon brought the fire under control by use of a tank truck with pumper and hose which Jackson keeps on the ground of his operation at all times for just such emergencies.

Illegal Removal of Shed At Riddle Charged

A complaint charging that Mabel Cunningham of Riddle removed a shed from property belonging to the Logsdon brothers has been filed in the local justice court, Judge Ira B. Riddle reported today. At the request of Mrs. Cunningham's attorney, consent has been given for a continuance of the arraignment, Judge Riddle said.

The justice of the peace also reported that Hilton Fogus of Riddle, against whom a complaint was filed, charging failure to report a motor vehicle accident, had posted cash bail in the sum of \$50 pending arraignment Saturday.

Bail in the sum of \$20, he said, has been furnished by Royal J. Curtis, truck driver, accused of axle overload.

Former Drain Editor Named to Pastorate
