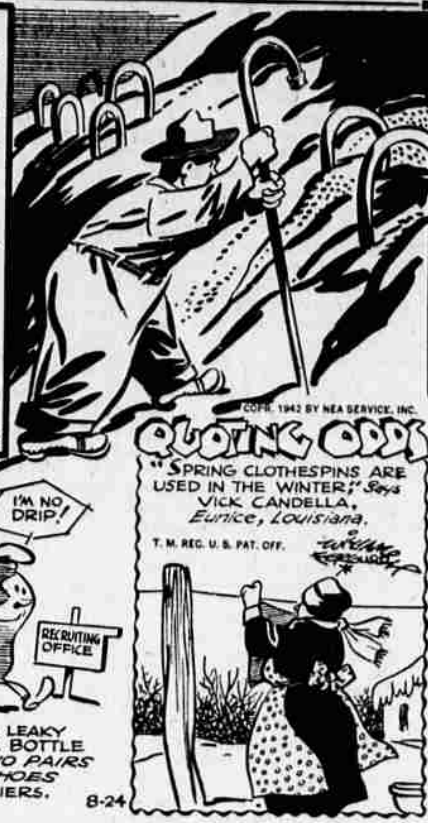

Tough Training Fits U. S. Troops For Commandos

AT THE UNITED STATES RANGERS BATTALION SOMEWHERE IN BRITAIN, Aug. 19. —(AP)—The United States rangers, Uncle Sam's new brand of fighting men who joined Canadian, British and Fighting French Commandos today in the first A. E. F. invasion of Hitler's Europe, had been training secretly for weeks under the tutelage of their seasoned British partners. Their mentors are men who toss hand grenades across the dinner table and casually jump 20-foot cliffs and their American pupils have been taught to kill with the cunning of the Indian and the ruthlessness of a gangster.

Just to show them what a trained ranger is expected to do, their British instructors stalked a deer in the forest and when the stag was surrounded a big Scot leaped upon him and killed him with a knife.

A sentry's throat can be slit in the same, silent way. On my visit I rowed with them in a collapsible canvas boat to a landing on a beach where tracer bullets from a British Bren gun were spewing so close to the gunwales you almost were able to reach out your hand to them.

Land mines and grenades splattered us with mud and water. Rifle tracer bullets singed by so close that one punctured a mess kit slung from a ranger's belt. Another nicked the guard off a bayonet atop one soldier's pack.

They have climbed 4,000-foot mountains through forests never before penetrated by man.

They have been on speed marches of 36 miles in half a day time and again.

They have practiced beach landings while rifle and machinegun fire bored holes through the paddles of the men manning the boats.

Rangers, one of America's most romantic fighting outfits are named after those men, who under Robert Rogers stalked northern America in the French and Indian war.

Like them, the new American rangers have been taught to kill expertly and silently with their

knives and bare hands as well as with guns and grenades. They are as much at home on sea as on land.

Boeing Executive Softens Talk On Women Workers

SEATTLE, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Take it easy girls; the Boeing aircraft executive who spoke disparagingly of feminine frivolity on the assembly line didn't mean to cast a reflection on the ability of the sex.

Reverberations from across the country led H. Oliver West, executive vice president of the Boeing company, to issue a statement last night that "on the whole, our women employees are doing an excellent job. The use of women has proved so satisfactory in general that we expect within a few months to have 50 per cent or more of our entire factory payroll made up of women workers."

He was quoted yesterday, following an interview with a touring group of women reporters, as belittling the flirtatious attitude of many girls in the aircraft plant. Reports to the contrary flooded the news wires from other air plants around the nation.

In Washington, D. C., Mary Anderson, head of the women's division, even suggested that "it would seem Mr. West is one of those men who didn't want women in the plant in the first place."

West protested his innocence. "The problems cited," West explained in his post-furore statement, "including the fact that some women took the jobs more for the glamor than for serious purposes, and that some were not sufficiently impressed with the importance of safety rules (in clothing and hair dress), applied to the minority rather than the majority of women workers."

At the Bremerton navy yard across Puget sound, where 1,200 women already are employed, Lieut. Commander D. J. Sass, personnel officer, reported there has been a smaller percentage of unsatisfactory women than men.

"There's no room here for a sweater girl," he commented. "We insist that our feminine employees wear overalls, flat-heeled and close-toed shoes and a tight-

Senator Seat At Stake As Texans Vote

O'Daniel, Allred Rivals In Run-Off; Contests in Other States Slated

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—(AP)—With candidates chosen for 18 of the 34 senate and 282 of the 435 house seats to be filled in the November elections, political observers eyed with interest today the Texas democratic senatorial primary run-off and the New York American labor party convention.

After next week's republican state convention in New York and primaries in California, Mississippi and South Carolina, the pre-election campaigns which with few exceptions reached an all-time low in attracting voter interest.

To date, 12 house members—8 democrats and 4 republicans—have missed renomination. Three other house democrats lost out in races for senatorial nominations. Only one incumbent senator—William J. Bulow, a South Dakota democrat—has been defeated in nomination races thus far.

Today's Texas run-off decides the 19th senatorial contest with Senator W. Lee O'Daniel, who failed to get a majority in the July 25 primary, vying with the runner-up James V. Allred.

Allred called O'Daniel an isolationist in the campaign. The latter retorted that no man who had a son in the army—as he has—was an isolationist. He also contended the war was not an issue.

The American labor party in New York was expected to name Joseph D. Mc Goldrick, New York

city comptroller, as a third contestant in the New York gubernatorial race because of its leaders' announced opposition to State Attorney General John J. Bennett, selected as the democratic nominee.

On Monday, empire state publications open a two-day convention to pick a candidate whom most everyone believes will be Thomas E. Dewey.

Gov. Olson in Race

California selects candidates Tuesday, for 23 house seats—three more than at present because of census reapportionment. Governor Olson is running for renomination on the democratic ticket. Taking advantage of a state law permitting cross-filing, Attorney General Earl Warren, a republican, filed both as a democratic and republican candidate for governor. Will Rogers, son of the late comedian, is a candidate for the democratic nomination for the house.

South Carolina democrats decide a primary contest Tuesday between Senator Burnet R. Maybank, who is filling out the term of James F. Byrnes, now on the U. S. supreme court, and Eugene Bleasie, former state supreme court justice.

Nominees for six house seats also will be chosen and Olin D. Johnson, former governor, faces Syndham Manning in the democratic gubernatorial contest for the office now held by R. M. Jeffries. State law prohibits a governor from serving two successive terms.

Mississippi's primaries on Tuesday designate democratic nominees for seven house seats and decide a contest between Senator Wall Doxey, successor to the late

Pat Harrison, and Rep. Ross Collins for the senatorial nominations.
