These Colorful Tips Aid Chic Dressing

In a season when fashion's chief to-do is color and color and more color, it's refreshing to hear Rise Stevens' self-made glamorguide. Her first rule is: "Never wear color as a flag. Use it to dramatize—but don't allow it to blotch out—personality."

This lovely young singer is both the Metropolitan Opera company's latest gift to Hollywood and Hollywood's gift to the Diamond Horseshoe. She went to Hollywood via a long tour of European study and concerts, and the "Met."

Now she's back—starring simultaneously in the opera's opening performance and in the movie version of "The Chocolate Soldier." Last season she won the Fashion Award as the best dressed opera star.

COLOR AFFECTS DRESS LINES

Having the impressive height of five feet, seven inches, Miss Stevens uses color-contrast with splash.

"Even so," she told me, "I wouldn't go in for full-length panels of color, which produce unduly long lines."

There's one basic principle to remember about color: the moment you have it in your costume in striking contrast, you are affecting importantly the lines of your raiment. You can, like Miss Stevens, turn that principle to your advantage, or you can let it take advantage of you. For instance, the extremely tall girl can cut her height by slashing her skirt with color—say, a broad contrasting border at the hem. Or she can let a brilliant full-length panel make her look like the Empire State building.

A very short girl should concentrate color at the shoulder and neck lines, which leaves the vertical lines of her costume unbroken. The color lines in her fabrics—prints, for instance—should be rounded lines. A good swirl pattern flatters her, likewise color or contrast in soft drapes at neck or waist.
